Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions

A BILL

To reauthorize the Museum and Library Services Act.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; REFERENCES.**

4 (a) SHORT TITLE.—This Act may be cited as the
5 “Museum and Library Services Act of 2016”.

6 (b) REFERENCES.—Except as otherwise expressly
7 provided, whenever in this Act an amendment or repeal
8 is expressed in terms of an amendment to, or repeal of,
9 a section or other provision, the reference shall be consid-
10 ered to be made to a section or other provision of the Mu-
11 seum and Library Services Act (20 U.S.C. 9101 et seq.).

1 **SEC. 2. GENERAL DEFINITIONS.**

2 Section 202 (20 U.S.C. 9101) is amended—

3 (1) by redesignating paragraphs (7) and (8) as
4 paragraphs (8) and (9), respectively; and

5 (2) by inserting after paragraph (6) the fol-
6 lowing:

7 “(7) INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION.—
8 The term ‘institution of higher education’ means an
9 institution of higher education as defined under sec-
10 tion 101 of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20
11 U.S.C. 1001).”.

12 **SEC. 3. DIRECTOR OF THE INSTITUTE.**

13 Section 204 (20 U.S.C. 9103) is amended—

14 (1) in subsection (a)(2), by inserting “, except
15 that if a successor to the Director has not been ap-
16 pointed by the President, by and with the advice and
17 consent of the Senate, as of the date of expiration
18 of the Director’s term, the Director may serve for
19 not more than 1 additional year until a successor
20 has been appointed and confirmed under paragraph
21 (1)” before the period;

22 (2) in subsection (f)—

23 (A) by striking paragraph (1) and insert-
24 ing the following:

25 “(1) programs and activities under the Elemen-
26 tary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (includ-

1 ing programs and activities under subparts 2 and 3
2 of part B of title II, and parts A and B of title IV,
3 of such Act);” and

4 (B) by striking paragraph (4) and insert-
5 ing the following:

6 “(4) Federal programs and activities that in-
7 crease the capacity of libraries and museums to act
8 as partners in economic and community develop-
9 ment, education and research, improving digital lit-
10 eracy skills, strengthening financial literacy, and en-
11 hancing public safety and health.”; and

12 (3) in subsection (g)—

13 (A) in the matter preceding paragraph (1),
14 by striking “Humanities, and the Director of
15 the Office of Management and Budget,” and in-
16 serting “Humanities, the Director of the Office
17 of Management and Budget, the Secretary of
18 Commerce, the Secretary of Veterans Affairs,
19 the Secretary of Defense, the Secretary of
20 Homeland Security, the Secretary of Agri-
21 culture, the Chief Executive Officer of the Cor-
22 poration for National and Community Service,
23 the Librarian of Congress, and the Archivist of
24 the United States,”;

1 (B) by striking paragraph (1) and insert-
 2 ing the following:

3 “(1) initiatives, materials, technology, or re-
 4 search to support education, workforce development,
 5 economic and business development, and related ac-
 6 tivities and services undertaken by libraries;”; and

7 (C) in paragraph (3), by striking “or tech-
 8 nology” and inserting “technology, or re-
 9 search”.

10 **SEC. 4. NATIONAL MUSEUM AND LIBRARY SERVICES**

11 **BOARD.**

12 Section 207(b) (20 U.S.C. 9105a(b)) is amended—

13 (1) in paragraph (2)(A)(i)(II), by inserting “,
 14 including rural communities” after “underserved
 15 communities”;

16 (2) in paragraph (3), in the first sentence—

17 (A) by inserting “, and the needs of,” after
 18 “persons from”; and

19 (B) by inserting “, including rural areas”
 20 after “United States”;

21 (3) in paragraph (4), by striking “and the Dep-
 22 uty Director of the Office of Museum Services” and
 23 inserting “the Deputy Director of the Office of Mu-
 24 seum Services, and the General Counsel of the Insti-
 25 tute”;

1 (4) by redesignating subsections (f) through (i)
2 as subsections (g) through (j), respectively; and

3 (5) by inserting after subsection (e) the fol-
4 lowing:

5 “(f) SECRETARY.—The General Counsel of the Insti-
6 tute shall serve as Secretary of the Museum and Library
7 Services Board.”.

8 **SEC. 5. POLICY RESEARCH, DATA COLLECTION, ANALYSIS**
9 **AND MODELING, EVALUATION, AND DISSEMI-**
10 **NATION.**

11 Section 210 (20 U.S.C. 9108) is amended—

12 (1) by striking the section heading and insert-
13 ing the following:

14 **“SEC. 210. POLICY RESEARCH, DATA COLLECTION, ANAL-**
15 **YSIS AND MODELING, EVALUATION, AND DIS-**
16 **SEMINATION.”;**

17 (2) by redesignating subsection (f) as sub-
18 section (g);

19 (3) by striking subsections (a) through (e) and
20 inserting the following:

21 “(a) IN GENERAL.—The Director shall regularly sup-
22 port and conduct, as appropriate, policy research, data col-
23 lection, analysis and modeling, evaluation, and dissemina-
24 tion of information to extend and improve the Nation’s
25 museum, library, and information services.

1 “(b) OBJECTIVES.—The objectives of the policy re-
2 search, data collection, analysis and modeling, evaluation,
3 and dissemination of information carried out under this
4 section include the following:

5 “(1) To enhance and expand the capacity of
6 museums, libraries, and information services to an-
7 ticipate, respond to, and meet the evolving needs of
8 communities and the public, including by identifying
9 trends and developments that may impact the need
10 for and delivery of services.

11 “(2) To provide information and data on the
12 role, value, and impact of museum, library, and in-
13 formation resources, including the identification of
14 trends and potential gaps in the availability and use
15 of museum and library services by their communities
16 and the public.

17 “(3) To measure the effectiveness of museums,
18 libraries, and information services throughout the
19 United States, including the impact of Federal pro-
20 grams authorized under this Act.

21 “(4) To identify indicators and outcomes that
22 can be used to create enhancements to the efficiency
23 and efficacy of museum, library, and information
24 services.

1 “(5) To promote advancement and growth in
2 museum, library, and information services through
3 sharing of best practices and effective strategies in
4 order to better serve the people of the United States.

5 “(6) To facilitate planning for, and building of,
6 institutional capacity in order to improve—

7 “(A) museum, library, and information
8 services at the national, State, local, and re-
9 gional levels; and

10 “(B) international communications and co-
11 operative networks.

12 “(7) To support and enhance collaborative pro-
13 fessional networks and consortia that use shared,
14 meaningful, and actionable data analysis and mod-
15 eling to advance museum, library, and information
16 services and address community needs.

17 “(c) AUTHORITY TO CONTRACT AND ENTER INTO
18 OTHER ARRANGEMENTS.—The Director is authorized to
19 enter into grants, contracts, cooperative agreements, and
20 other arrangements with Federal agencies, public and pri-
21 vate organizations, and other entities with expertise the
22 Director determines appropriate, to further the objectives
23 described in subsection (b) and to carry out the respon-
24 sibilities under subsection (f).

1 “(d) CONSULTATION AND PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT.—
2 In carrying out subsection (a) and in furtherance of the
3 objectives described in subsection (b), the Director—

4 “(1) shall conduct ongoing collaboration (as de-
5 termined appropriate by the Director) and consult
6 with—

7 “(A) State library administrative agencies;
8 and

9 “(B) National, State, and regional mu-
10 seum and library organizations; and

11 “(2) may also collaborate or consult with—

12 “(A) cooperative networks of geographic-
13 or discipline-based museums and libraries; and

14 “(B) other applicable agencies, organiza-
15 tions (including international organizations),
16 entities (including entities with expertise in the
17 fields of data collection, analysis and modeling,
18 and evaluation), and community stakeholders.

19 “(e) ASSISTANCE TO MUSEUMS AND LIBRARIES.—
20 The Director shall provide technical support and assist-
21 ance (and other resources, to the extent practicable) to
22 ensure consistency in data reporting and help the museum
23 and library fields with meeting the objectives of this sec-
24 tion.

25 “(f) DISSEMINATION.—

1 “(1) IN GENERAL.—Each year, the Director
2 shall widely disseminate, as appropriate to further
3 the objectives described in subsection (b)—

4 “(A) the results, data, reports, findings,
5 studies, surveys, and other information obtained
6 under this section;

7 “(B) the means and approaches by which
8 the objectives described in subsection (b) were
9 accomplished; and

10 “(C) information regarding the manner
11 and extent to which collaboration and consulta-
12 tion were conducted, as required by subsection
13 (d).

14 “(2) FORMATS TO BE USED.—The information
15 described in paragraph (1) shall be shared in for-
16 mats that facilitate access and ease of use and are
17 searchable.”; and

18 (4) in subsection (g)(1), as redesignated by
19 paragraph (2)—

20 (A) by striking “2011” and inserting
21 “2017”; and

22 (B) by striking “2012 through 2016” and
23 inserting “2018 through 2022”.

24 **SEC. 6. ADMINISTRATIVE FUNDS.**

25 Section 210C (20 U.S.C. 9111) is amended—

1 (1) by striking “a total of 7 percent of the
2 funds” and inserting “\$17,000,000 of the total
3 funds”; and

4 (2) by striking “sections 210(f)” and inserting
5 “sections 210(g)”.

6 **SEC. 7. PURPOSE RELATING TO LIBRARY SERVICES AND**
7 **TECHNOLOGY.**

8 Section 212 (20 U.S.C. 9121) is amended—

9 (1) in paragraph (1), by inserting “, edu-
10 cation,” after “library”;

11 (2) by striking paragraph (5) and inserting the
12 following:

13 “(5) to promote literacy, education, and lifelong
14 learning, including by building learning partnerships
15 with school libraries in our Nation’s schools and de-
16 veloping resources, capabilities, and programs in
17 support of State and local efforts to offer a well-
18 rounded educational experience to all students;”;

19 (3) by redesignating paragraphs (6) through
20 (9) as paragraphs (7) through (10), respectively;

21 (4) by inserting after paragraph (5) the fol-
22 lowing:

23 “(6) to enable libraries to serve as anchor insti-
24 tutions to support community revitalization through
25 enhancing and expanding the services and resources

1 provided by libraries, including those services and re-
 2 sources relating to workforce development, economic
 3 and business development, critical thinking skills,
 4 digital literacy skills, financial literacy skills, and
 5 new and emerging technology;”;

6 (5) in paragraph (7), as redesignated by para-
 7 graph (3), by inserting “, including those from di-
 8 verse and underrepresented backgrounds,” after
 9 “professionals”;

10 (6) in paragraph (9), as redesignated by para-
 11 graph (3), by striking “and” after the semicolon;

12 (7) in paragraph (10), as redesignated by para-
 13 graph (3), by striking the period at the end and in-
 14 serting “; and”; and

15 (8) by adding at the end the following:

16 “(11) to encourage, support, and disseminate
 17 model programs of library and museum collabora-
 18 tion.”.

19 **SEC. 8. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS FOR LI-**
 20 **BRARY SERVICES AND TECHNOLOGY.**

21 Section 214(a) (20 U.S.C. 9123(a)) is amended—

22 (1) in paragraph (1), by striking “fiscal year
 23 2011 and such sums as may be necessary for each
 24 of the fiscal years 2012 through 2016” and insert-
 25 ing “fiscal year 2017 and such sums as may be nec-

1 essary for each of the fiscal years 2018 through
2 2022”; and

3 (2) in paragraph (2), by striking “fiscal year
4 2011 and such sums as may be necessary for each
5 of the fiscal years 2012 through 2016” and insert-
6 ing “fiscal year 2017 and such sums as may be nec-
7 essary for each of the fiscal years 2018 through
8 2022”.

9 **SEC. 9. RESERVATIONS AND ALLOTMENTS.**

10 Section 221 (20 U.S.C. 9131) is amended—

11 (1) in subsection (a)(1)(A), by striking “1.75”
12 and inserting “2.25”; and

13 (2) in subsection (b)(3), by striking subpara-
14 graph (C).

15 **SEC. 10. STATE PLANS.**

16 Section 224(b)(6) (20 U.S.C. 9134(b)(6)) is amend-
17 ed—

18 (1) by striking subparagraph (A) and inserting
19 the following:

20 “(A) programs and activities under the El-
21 ementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965
22 (including programs and activities under sub-
23 parts 2 and 3 of part B of title II, and parts
24 A and B of title IV, of such Act);”;

25 (2) in subparagraph (C)—

1 (A) in clause (i), by striking “and” after
2 the semicolon; and

3 (B) by adding at the end the following:

4 “(iii) the activities carried out by the
5 State in support of adult education and lit-
6 eracy under title II of such Act; and”;

7 (3) in subparagraph (D)—

8 (A) by inserting “, business,” after “eco-
9 nomic”; and

10 (B) by striking “and health information”
11 and inserting “, health information, digital lit-
12 eracy, and financial literacy”.

13 **SEC. 11. GRANTS TO STATES.**

14 Section 231(a) (20 U.S.C. 9141(a)) is amended—

15 (1) in paragraph (1)—

16 (A) by inserting “(including new and
17 emerging technology)” after “formats”; and

18 (B) by striking “workforce development,
19 and digital literacy skills” and inserting “work-
20 force development, economic and business devel-
21 opment, critical thinking skills, digital literacy
22 skills, and financial literacy skills”; and

23 (2) in paragraph (3)(B), by inserting “, includ-
24 ing those from diverse and underrepresented back-
25 grounds,” after “professionals”.

1 **SEC. 12. NATIONAL LEADERSHIP ACTIVITIES.**

2 Section 262 (20 U.S.C. 9162) is amended—

3 (1) in subsection (a)—

4 (A) in the matter preceding paragraph

5 (1)—

6 (i) by striking “of awarding grants or
7 entering into contracts or cooperative
8 agreements”; and

9 (ii) by striking “museums” and all
10 that follows through “activities that may
11 include—” and inserting “museums, in-
12 cluding by carrying out activities such
13 as—”;

14 (B) in paragraph (2)(A), by inserting “and
15 emerging” after “new”; and

16 (C) in paragraph (4), by inserting “, in-
17 cluding such cooperative efforts” after “ef-
18 forts”;

19 (2) in subsection (b)—

20 (A) by striking paragraph (1) and insert-
21 ing the following:

22 “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Director may carry
23 out the activities described in subsection (a) by en-
24 tering into arrangements, including grants, con-
25 tracts, cooperative agreements, and other forms of
26 assistance, with libraries, library consortia and asso-

1 ciations, institutions of higher education, museums,
2 and other entities that the Director determines ap-
3 propriate.”; and

4 (B) in paragraph (2), by striking “and co-
5 operative agreements” and inserting “coopera-
6 tive agreements, and other arrangements or
7 forms of assistance”; and

8 (3) in subsection (c)—

12 after “library leaders”; and

14 ing the following:

15 “(3) enhancing the training and professional
16 development of librarians and the library workforce

16 (4) in paragraph (4), by inserting “diverse” be-
17 fore “cultural”;

18 (5) in paragraph (5), by striking “as a result
19 of their increasing use by the public” and inserting
20 “as they serve their communities in new and dif-
21 ferent ways”;

22 (6) in paragraph (8), by striking “and” after
23 the semicolon;

24 (7) in paragraph (9)—

1 (A) by striking “State level” and inserting
2 “State and regional levels”; and

3 (B) by striking the period at the end and
4 inserting “; and”; and

5 (8) by adding at the end the following:

6 “(10) to assist museums in their civic engage-
7 ment efforts to ensure that every person in the
8 United States has access to high-quality museum
9 services.”.

17 following:

18 “(2) supporting museums in building learning
19 partnerships with the Nation’s schools and devel-
20 oping museum resources, capabilities, and programs
21 in support of State and local efforts to offer a well-
22 rounded educational experience to all students;”;

23 (2) in paragraph (3)—

24 (A) in subparagraph (C), by striking
25 “and” after the semicolon;

1 (B) by redesignating subparagraph (D) as
2 subparagraph (E); and

3 (C) by inserting after subparagraph (C)
4 the following:

5 “(D) curate, stabilize, and organize object-
6 related information; and”;

7 (3) by redesignating paragraphs (5) through
8 (11) as paragraphs (6) through (12), respectively;

9 (4) by inserting the following after paragraph
10 (4):

11 “(5) creating shared technology tools and data
12 resources, and developing museum staff training
13 plans to improve and maximize museum services
14 through organizations such as museum associations,
15 professional networks, community-based organiza-
16 tions, and foundations, and through other collabo-
17 rative mechanisms;”;

18 (5) in paragraph (6), as redesignated by para-

1 (C) in subparagraph (E), as redesignated
2 by subparagraph (A), by striking “and” after
3 the semicolon;

4 (D) in subparagraph (F), as redesignated
5 by subparagraph (A), by inserting “and” after
6 the semicolon; and

7 (E) by adding at the end the following:

8 “(G) other relevant research and policy or-
9 ganizations;”;

10 (6) by striking paragraph (7), as redesignated
11 by paragraph (3), and inserting the following:

12 “(7) encouraging the use of new and emerging
13 technologies and media, including new ways to dis-
14 seminate information, engage varied audiences in ex-
15 periential learning, and support teachers and stu-
16 dents to enhance access to and engagement with
17 museum collections, programs, and services;”;

8 ices.”.

1 **SEC. 17. 21ST CENTURY MUSEUM PROFESSIONAL PRO-**
2 **GRAM.**

3 Subtitle C (20 U.S.C. 9171 et seq.) is amended—

4 (1) by redesignating section 275 as section 276;

5 and

6 (2) by inserting after section 274 the following:

7 **“SEC. 275. 21ST CENTURY MUSEUM PROFESSIONAL PRO-**
8 **GRAM.**

9 “(a) PURPOSE.—It is the purpose of this section to
10 develop and enhance the diverse workforce of museum pro-
11 fessionals in order to best anticipate and serve the needs
12 of their local communities and the public by—

13 “(1) recruiting and educating future museum
14 professionals from diverse and underrepresented
15 backgrounds, including through encouraging middle
16 or high school students and postsecondary students
17 to pursue careers and build skills in museum serv-
18 ices;

19 “(2) developing museum leaders from diverse
20 and underrepresented backgrounds, including by in-
21 creasing the capacity of institutions that offer early
22 career and mid-career professional development, spe-
23 cialized training, and leadership programs that di-
24 rectly relate to museum studies and management;
25 and

1 “(3) supporting the professional development of
2 current museum professionals and the museum
3 workforce to enable them to meet identified needs of
4 their communities.

5 “(b) ACTIVITIES.—From the amounts provided under
6 section 276, the Director may enter into arrangements,
7 including grants, contracts, cooperative agreements, and
8 other forms of assistance, with museums, museum con-
9 sortia and associations, institutions of higher education,
10 and other entities that the Director determines appro-
11 priate, for projects that further the purpose of this section,
12 such as projects that—

13 “(1) increase the number of students from di-
14 verse and underrepresented backgrounds enrolled in
15 graduate and undergraduate museum-related pro-
16 grams as well as other relevant programs offered
17 through other education-focused entities, such as
18 State and local governments, associations, and non-
19 profit organizations, in order to effectively prepare
20 the students for, and retain the students in, careers
21 in museum services;

22 “(2) recruit future museum professionals from
23 diverse and underrepresented backgrounds, including
24 efforts to attract promising middle school, high
25 school, or postsecondary students to consider careers

1 in museum services such as through offering paid in-
2 ternships, mentoring, and fellowship opportunities;

3 “(3) develop new or enhance current profes-
4 sional development and retention programs for mu-
5 seum professionals and the museum workforce, in-
6 cluding through mid-career skill-building, mentoring,
7 and fellowships, and by supporting the development
8 of local and regional networks for those who may
9 not have easy access to such opportunities; and

10 “(4) support and conduct research, needs as-
11 sessments, pilot programs, and evaluation of edu-
12 cation and professional development programs to ex-
13 plore successful approaches that can successfully re-
14 cruit, prepare, educate, and retain the next genera-
15 tion of museum professionals.
