1 AN ACT Relating to elevating road maintenance and preservation in 2 transportation planning; amending RCW 47.04.280; and creating a new 3 section.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

The legislature finds that the road system 5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. 6 in Washington state includes more than one hundred sixty-seven 7 thousand lane miles and more than three thousand three hundred stateowned bridges that require maintenance, preservation, and replacement 8 for the transportation network to continue to function. It is a 9 10 priority for the people and the public good for the transportation 11 system to be in a state of good repair. In the 2019 transportation asset management plan, the department of transportation proclaimed a 12 critical need for additional funding to maintain the existing assets 13 14 on the transportation network. The legislature acknowledges the 15 critical need for resilience and preservation of the existing system, 16 and intends the transportation public policy of this state to embody 17 that public priority.

18 Sec. 2. RCW 47.04.280 and 2016 c 35 s 3 are each amended to read 19 as follows: 1 (1) It is the intent of the legislature to establish policy goals 2 for the planning, operation, performance of, and investment in, the 3 state's transportation system. ((The policy goals established under 4 this section are deemed consistent with the benchmark categories 5 adopted by the state's blue ribbon commission on transportation on 6 November 30, 2000.)) Public investments in transportation should 7 support achievement of these policy goals:

8 (a) ((Economic vitality: To promote and develop transportation 9 systems that stimulate, support, and enhance the movement of people 10 and goods to ensure a prosperous economy;

11 (b)) Preservation: To maintain, preserve, and extend the life 12 and utility of prior investments in transportation systems and 13 services;

14 (((c))) <u>(b)</u> Safety: To provide for and improve the safety and 15 security of transportation customers and the transportation system;

16 (c) Stewardship: To continuously improve the quality, 17 effectiveness, resilience, and efficiency of the transportation 18 system;

(d) Mobility: To improve the predictable movement of goods and people throughout Washington state, including congestion relief and improved freight mobility;

(e) <u>Economic vitality: To promote and develop transportation</u> systems that stimulate, support, and enhance the movement of people and goods to ensure a prosperous economy; and

25 (f) Environment: To enhance Washington's quality of life through 26 transportation investments that promote energy conservation, enhance 27 healthy communities, and protect the environment((; and

28 (f) Stewardship: To continuously improve the quality, 29 effectiveness, and efficiency of the transportation system)).

30 (2) The powers, duties, and functions of state transportation 31 agencies must be performed in a manner consistent with the policy 32 goals set forth in subsection (1) of this section <u>with preservation</u> 33 <u>and safety being the preeminent priority</u>.

34 (3) These policy goals are intended to be the basis for 35 establishing detailed and measurable objectives and related 36 performance measures.

37 (4) It is the intent of the legislature that the office of 38 financial management, in consultation with the transportation 39 commission, establish objectives and performance measures for the 40 department and other state agencies with transportation-related

1 responsibilities to ensure transportation system performance at local, regional, and state government levels progresses toward the 2 attainment of the policy goals set forth in subsection (1) of this 3 section. The office of financial management shall submit objectives 4 and performance measures to the legislature for its review and shall 5 6 provide copies of the same to the commission during each regular session of the legislature during an even-numbered year thereafter. 7 For the 2022 legislative session, the executive branch is encouraged 8 to establish objectives and plan in furtherance of reducing the 9 10 preservation and replacement backlog in the transportation system.

(5) A local or regional agency engaging in transportation 11 12 planning may voluntarily establish objectives and performance measures to demonstrate progress toward the attainment of the policy 13 goals set forth in subsection (1) of this section or any other 14 15 transportation policy goals established by the local or regional 16 agency. A local or regional agency engaging in transportation 17 planning is encouraged to provide local and regional objectives and 18 performance measures to be included with the objectives and 19 performance measures submitted to the legislature pursuant to subsection (4) of this section. 20

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(6) This section does not create a private right of action.

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
