AN ACT Relating to safety net award distributions for students receiving special education services outside of the state of Washington; and amending RCW 28A.150.392.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 Sec. 1. RCW 28A.150.392 and 2019 c 387 s 2 are each amended to 6 read as follows:

7 (1) (a) To the extent necessary, funds shall be made available for
8 safety net awards for districts with demonstrated needs for special
9 education funding beyond the amounts provided through the special
10 education funding formula under RCW 28A.150.390.

(b) If the federal safety net awards based on the federal eligibility threshold exceed the federal appropriation in any fiscal year, then the superintendent shall expend all available federal discretionary funds necessary to meet this need.

15 (2) Safety net funds shall be awarded by the state safety net 16 oversight committee subject to the following conditions and 17 limitations:

18 (a) The committee shall award additional funds for districts that 19 can convincingly demonstrate that all legitimate expenditures for 20 special education exceed all available revenues from state funding 21 formulas. 1 (b) In the determination of need, the committee shall consider 2 additional available revenues from federal sources.

3 (c) Differences in program costs attributable to district 4 philosophy, service delivery choice, or accounting practices are not 5 a legitimate basis for safety net awards.

6 (d) In the determination of need, the committee shall require 7 that districts demonstrate that they are maximizing their eligibility for all state revenues related to services for students eligible for 8 special education and all federal revenues from federal impact aid, 9 medicaid, and the individuals with disabilities education act-Part B 10 and appropriate special projects. Awards associated with (e) and (f) 11 12 of this subsection shall not exceed the total of a district's specific determination of need. 13

(e) The committee shall then consider the extraordinary high cost needs of one or more individual students eligible for and receiving special education. Differences in costs attributable to district philosophy, service delivery choice, or accounting practices are not a legitimate basis for safety net awards.

(f) Using criteria developed by the committee, the committee shall then consider extraordinary costs associated with communities that draw a larger number of families with children in need of special education services, which may include consideration of proximity to group homes, military bases, and regional hospitals. Safety net awards under this subsection (2)(f) shall be adjusted to reflect amounts awarded under (e) of this subsection.

(g) The committee shall then consider the extraordinary high cost needs of one or more individual students eligible for and receiving special education served in residential schools as defined in RCW ((28A.190.020)) 28A.190.005, programs for juveniles under the department of corrections, and programs for juveniles operated by city and county jails to the extent they are providing a secondary program of education.

33 (h) The maximum allowable indirect cost for calculating safety 34 net eligibility may not exceed the federal restricted indirect cost 35 rate for the district plus one percent.

36 (i) Safety net awards shall be adjusted based on the percent of 37 potential medicaid eligible students billed as calculated by the 38 superintendent of public instruction in accordance with chapter 318, 39 Laws of 1999.

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(j) Safety net awards must be adjusted for any audit findings or
 exceptions related to special education funding.

(3) The superintendent of public instruction shall adopt such 3 rules and procedures as are necessary to administer the special 4 education funding and safety net award process. By December 1, 2018, 5 6 the superintendent shall review and revise the rules to achieve full and complete implementation of the requirements of this subsection 7 and subsection (4) of this section including revisions to rules that 8 provide additional flexibility to access community impact awards. 9 Before revising any standards, procedures, or rules, 10 the superintendent shall consult with the office of financial management 11 12 and the fiscal committees of the legislature. In adopting and revising the rules, the superintendent shall ensure the application 13 process to access safety net funding is streamlined, timelines for 14 submission are not in conflict, feedback to school districts is 15 timely and provides sufficient information to allow school districts 16 17 to understand how to correct any deficiencies in a safety net application, and that there is consistency between awards approved by 18 19 school district and by application period. The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall also provide technical 20 21 assistance to school districts in preparing and submitting special 22 education safety net applications.

23 (4) On an annual basis, the superintendent shall survey districts regarding their satisfaction with the safety net process and consider 24 25 feedback from districts to improve the safety net process. Each year 26 by December 1st, the superintendent shall prepare and submit a report to the office of financial management and the appropriate policy and 27 28 fiscal committees of the legislature that summarizes the survey 29 results and those changes made to the safety net process as a result of the school district feedback. 30

31 (5) The safety net oversight committee appointed by the 32 superintendent of public instruction shall consist of:

33 (a) One staff member from the office of the superintendent of 34 public instruction;

35 (b) Staff of the office of the state auditor who shall be 36 nonvoting members of the committee; and

37 (c) One or more representatives from school districts or 38 educational service districts knowledgeable of special education 39 programs and funding.

1 (6) Beginning in the 2023-24 school year, the office of the superintendent of public instruction must distribute safety net 2 awards to school districts on a quarterly basis if the following 3 criteria are met: 4 (a) The safety net award is provided for a high-cost student that 5 6 receives special education services from an approved nonpublic agency 7 located outside of the state of Washington; (b) The school district successfully applied for and received a 8 safety net award for the high-cost student in a prior school year and 9 10 the student's placement has not changed since that safety net award was granted; and 11 12 (c) The school district meets all other safety net award eligibility requirements as determined by the safety net oversight 13 14 committee. (7) Beginning in the 2019-20 school year, a high-need student is 15 16 eligible for safety net awards from state funding under subsection 17 (2) (e) and (g) of this section if the student's individualized education program costs exceed two and three-tenths times the average 18 19 per-pupil expenditure as defined in Title 20 U.S.C. Sec. 7801, the
