ARTICLE 1

GENERAL PROVISIONS

15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 101. SHORT TITLE. This chapter may be cited 16 as the uniform guardianship, conservatorship, and other protective 17 arrangements act. <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 102. DEFINITIONS. The definitions in this
 section apply throughout this chapter unless the context clearly
 requires otherwise.

4 (1) "Adult" means an individual at least eighteen years of age or 5 an emancipated individual under eighteen years of age.

6 (2) "Adult subject to conservatorship" means an adult for whom a 7 conservator has been appointed under this chapter.

8 (3) "Adult subject to guardianship" means an adult for whom a 9 guardian has been appointed under this chapter.

10 (4) "Asset protection arrangement" is a verified receipt signed 11 by the custodian of funds stating that a savings and loan association 12 or bank, trust company, escrow corporation, or other corporations 13 approved by the court hold the cash or securities of the individual 14 subject to conservatorship subject to withdrawal only by order of the 15 court.

16 (5) "Claim" includes a claim against an individual or 17 conservatorship estate, whether arising in contract, tort, or 18 otherwise.

19 (6) "Commissioner" means the person appointed by the court 20 pursuant to section 512 of this act.

(7) "Conservator" means a person appointed by a court to make decisions with respect to the property or financial affairs of an individual subject to conservatorship. The term includes a coconservator.

25 (8) "Conservatorship estate" means the property subject to 26 conservatorship under this chapter.

(9) "Evaluation and treatment facility" has the same meaning asprovided in RCW 71.05.020.

(10) "Full conservatorship" means a conservatorship that grantsthe conservator all powers available under this chapter.

(11) "Full guardianship" means a guardianship that grants theguardian all powers available under this chapter.

33 (12) "Guardian" means a person appointed by the court to make 34 decisions with respect to the personal affairs of an individual. The 35 term includes a co-guardian but does not include a guardian ad litem.

36 (13) "Guardian ad litem" means a person appointed to inform the 37 court about, and to represent, the needs and best interests of an 38 individual.

39 (14) "Individual subject to conservatorship" means an adult or 40 minor for whom a conservator has been appointed under this chapter. 1 (15) "Individual subject to guardianship" means an adult or minor 2 for whom a guardian has been appointed under this chapter.

3 (16) "Less restrictive alternative" means an approach to meeting 4 an individual's needs which restricts fewer rights of the individual 5 than would the appointment of a guardian or conservator. The term 6 includes supported decision making, appropriate technological 7 assistance, appointment of a representative payee, and appointment of 8 an agent by the individual, including appointment under a power of 9 attorney for health care or power of attorney for finances.

10 (17) "Letters of office" means a record issued by a court 11 certifying a guardian's or conservator's authority to act.

12 (18) "Limited conservatorship" means a conservatorship that 13 grants the conservator less than all powers available under this 14 chapter, grants powers over only certain property, or otherwise 15 restricts the powers of the conservator.

16 (19) "Limited guardianship" means a guardianship that grants the 17 guardian less than all powers available under this chapter or 18 otherwise restricts the powers of the guardian.

19 (20) "Long-term care facility" has the same meaning as provided 20 in RCW 70.129.010.

21 (21) "Minor" means an unemancipated individual under eighteen 22 years of age.

23 (22) "Minor subject to conservatorship" means a minor for whom a 24 conservator has been appointed under this chapter.

(23) "Minor subject to guardianship" means a minor for whom aguardian has been appointed under this chapter.

27 (24) "Parent" does not include an individual whose parental 28 rights have been terminated.

(25) "Person" means an individual, estate, business or nonprofit
 entity, public corporation, government or governmental subdivision,
 agency, or instrumentality, or other legal entity.

32 (26) "Professional guardian or conservator" means a guardian or 33 conservator appointed under this chapter who is not a member of the 34 family of the person subject to guardianship or conservatorship 35 established under this chapter and who charges fees for carrying out 36 the duties of court-appointed guardian or conservator for three or 37 more persons.

38 (27) "Property" includes tangible and intangible property.

39 (28) "Protective arrangement instead of conservatorship" means a 40 court order entered under section 503 of this act. (29) "Protective arrangement instead of guardianship" means a
 court order entered under section 502 of this act.

3 (30) "Protective arrangement under article 5 of this chapter"
4 means a court order entered under section 502 or 503 of this act.

5 (31) "Record," used as a noun, means information that is 6 inscribed on a tangible medium or that is stored in an electronic or 7 other medium and is retrievable in perceivable form.

8 (32) "Respondent" means an individual for whom appointment of a 9 guardian or conservator or a protective arrangement instead of 10 guardianship or conservatorship is sought.

11 (33) "Sign" means, with present intent to authenticate or adopt a
12 record:

13 (a) To execute or adopt a tangible symbol; or

14 (b) To attach to or logically associate with the record an 15 electronic symbol, sound, or process.

16 (34) "Standby guardian" means a person appointed by the court 17 under section 208 of this act.

(35) "State" means a state of the United States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the United States Virgin Islands, or any territory or insular possession subject to the jurisdiction of the United States. The term includes a federally recognized Indian tribe.

(36) "Supported decision making" means assistance from one or more persons of an individual's choosing in understanding the nature and consequences of potential personal and financial decisions, which enables the individual to make the decisions, and in communicating a decision once made if consistent with the individual's wishes.

(37) "Visitor" means the person appointed by the court pursuantto section 304(1) or 405(1) of this act.

29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 103. SUPPLEMENTAL PRINCIPLES OF LAW AND 30 EQUITY APPLICABLE. Unless displaced by a particular provision of this 31 chapter, the principles of law and equity supplement its provisions.

32 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 104. SUBJECT MATTER JURISDICTION. (1) Except 33 to the extent jurisdiction is precluded by the uniform child custody 34 jurisdiction and enforcement act (chapter 26.27 RCW), the superior 35 court of each county has jurisdiction over a guardianship for a minor 36 domiciled or present in this state. The court has jurisdiction over a 37 conservatorship or protective arrangement instead of conservatorship 38 for a minor domiciled or having property in this state. 1 (2) The superior court of each county has jurisdiction over a 2 guardianship, conservatorship, or protective arrangement under 3 article 5 of this chapter for an adult as provided in the uniform 4 adult guardianship and protective proceedings jurisdiction act 5 (chapter 11.90 RCW).

6 (3) After notice is given in a proceeding for a guardianship, 7 conservatorship, or protective arrangement under article 5 of this 8 chapter and until termination of the proceeding, the court in which 9 the petition is filed has:

(a) Exclusive jurisdiction to determine the need for theguardianship, conservatorship, or protective arrangement;

12 (b) Exclusive jurisdiction to determine how property of the 13 respondent must be managed, expended, or distributed to or for the 14 use of the respondent, an individual who is dependent in fact on the 15 respondent, or other claimant;

16 (c) Nonexclusive jurisdiction to determine the validity of a 17 claim against the respondent or property of the respondent or a 18 question of title concerning the property; and

19 (d) If a guardian or conservator is appointed, exclusive 20 jurisdiction over issues related to administration of the 21 guardianship or conservatorship.

(4) A court that appoints a guardian or conservator, or authorizes a protective arrangement under article 5 of this chapter, has exclusive and continuing jurisdiction over the proceeding until the court terminates the proceeding or the appointment or protective arrangement expires by its terms.

27 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 105. TRANSFER OF PROCEEDING. (1) This section 28 does not apply to a guardianship or conservatorship for an adult that 29 is subject to the transfer provisions of the uniform adult 30 guardianship and protective proceedings jurisdiction act (chapter 31 11.90 RCW).

32 (2) After appointment of a guardian or conservator, the court 33 that made the appointment may transfer the proceeding to a court in 34 another county in this state or another state if transfer is in the 35 best interest of the individual subject to the guardianship or 36 conservatorship.

(3) If a proceeding for a guardianship or conservatorship is pending in another state or a foreign country and a petition for guardianship or conservatorship for the same individual is filed in a

1 court in this state, the court shall notify the court in the other 2 state or foreign country and, after consultation with that court, 3 assume or decline jurisdiction, whichever is in the best interest of 4 the respondent.

5 (4) A guardian or conservator appointed in another state or 6 country may petition the court for appointment as a guardian or 7 conservator in this state for the same individual if jurisdiction in 8 this state is or will be established. The appointment may be made on 9 proof of appointment in the other state or foreign country and 10 presentation of a certified copy of the part of the court record in 11 the other state or country specified by the court in this state.

12 (5) Notice of hearing on a petition under subsection (4) of this section, together with a copy of the petition, must be given to the 13 14 respondent, if the respondent is at least twelve years of age at the time of the hearing, and to the persons that would be entitled to 15 16 notice if the procedures for appointment of a guardian or conservator 17 under this chapter were applicable. The court shall make the 18 appointment unless it determines the appointment would not be in the 19 best interest of the respondent.

(6) Not later than fourteen days after appointment under subsection (5) of this section, the guardian or conservator shall give a copy of the order of appointment to the individual subject to guardianship or conservatorship, if the individual is at least twelve years of age, and to all persons given notice of the hearing on the petition.

26 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 106. VENUE. (1) Venue for a guardianship 27 proceeding for a minor is in:

(a) The county in which the minor resides or is present at thetime the proceeding commences; or

30 (b) The county in which another proceeding concerning the custody 31 or parental rights of the minor is pending.

32 (2) Venue for a guardianship proceeding or protective arrangement33 instead of guardianship for an adult is in:

34 (a) The county in which the respondent resides;

35 (b) If the respondent has been admitted to an institution by 36 court order, the county in which the court is located; or

37 (c) If the proceeding is for appointment of an emergency guardian38 for an adult, the county in which the respondent is present.

1 (3) Venue for a conservatorship proceeding or protective 2 arrangement instead of conservatorship is in:

3 (a) The county in which the respondent resides, whether or not a
4 guardian has been appointed in another county or other jurisdiction;
5 or

6 (b) If the respondent does not reside in this state, in any 7 county in which property of the respondent is located.

8 (4) If proceedings under this chapter are brought in more than 9 one county, the court of the county in which the first proceeding is 10 brought has the exclusive right to proceed unless the court 11 determines venue is properly in another court or the interest of 12 justice otherwise requires transfer of the proceeding.

13 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 107. PRACTICE IN COURT. (1) Except as 14 otherwise provided in this chapter, the rules of evidence and civil 15 procedure, including rules concerning appellate review, govern a 16 proceeding under this chapter.

17 (2) If proceedings for a guardianship, conservatorship, or 18 protective arrangement under article 5 of this chapter for the same 19 individual are commenced or pending in the same court, the 20 proceedings may be consolidated.

(3) A respondent may demand a jury trial in a proceeding under
 this chapter on the issue whether a basis exists for appointment of a
 guardian or conservator.

24 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 108. LETTERS OF OFFICE. (1) The court shall 25 issue letters of guardianship to a guardian on filing by the guardian 26 of an acceptance of appointment.

(2) The court shall issue letters of conservatorship to a conservator on filing by the conservator of an acceptance of appointment and filing of any required bond or compliance with any other asset protection arrangement required by the court.

31 (3) Limitations on the powers of a guardian or conservator or on 32 the property subject to conservatorship must be stated on the letters 33 of office.

34 (4) The court at any time may limit the powers conferred on a 35 guardian or conservator. The court shall issue new letters of office 36 to reflect the limitation.

1 (5) A guardian or conservator may not act on behalf of a person 2 under guardianship or conservatorship without valid letters of 3 office.

4 (6) The clerk of the superior court shall issue letters of 5 guardianship or conservatorship in or substantially in the same form 6 as set forth in section 605 of this act.

7 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 109. EFFECT OF ACCEPTANCE OF APPOINTMENT. On 8 acceptance of appointment, a guardian or conservator submits to 9 personal jurisdiction of the court in this state in any proceeding 10 relating to the guardianship or conservatorship.

11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 110. CO-GUARDIAN—CO-CONSERVATOR. (1) The 12 court at any time may appoint a co-guardian or co-conservator to 13 serve immediately or when a designated event occurs.

14 (2) A co-guardian or co-conservator appointed to serve 15 immediately may act when that co-guardian or co-conservator complies 16 with section 108 of this act.

17 (3) A co-guardian or co-conservator appointed to serve when a18 designated event occurs may act when:

19 (a) The event occurs; and

20 (b) That co-guardian or co-conservator complies with section 108 21 of this act.

(4) Unless an order of appointment under subsection (1) of this
 section or subsequent order states otherwise, co-guardians or co conservators shall make decisions jointly.

25 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 111. JUDICIAL APPOINTMENT OF SUCCESSOR 26 GUARDIAN OR SUCCESSOR CONSERVATOR. (1) The court at any time may 27 appoint a successor guardian or successor conservator to serve 28 immediately or when a designated event occurs.

(2) A person entitled under section 202 or 302 of this act to petition the court to appoint a guardian may petition the court to appoint a successor guardian. A person entitled under section 402 of this act to petition the court to appoint a conservator may petition the court to appoint a successor conservator.

34 (3) A successor guardian or successor conservator appointed to 35 serve when a designated event occurs may act as guardian or 36 conservator when:

37 (a) The event occurs; and

(b) The successor complies with section 108 of this act.

2 (4) A successor guardian or successor conservator has the
3 predecessor's powers unless otherwise provided by the court.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 112. EFFECT OF DEATH, REMOVAL, OR RESIGNATION OF GUARDIAN OR CONSERVATOR. (1) Appointment of a guardian or conservator terminates on the death or removal of the guardian or conservator, or when the court under subsection (2) of this section approves a resignation of the guardian or conservator.

9 (2) A guardian or conservator must petition the court to resign. 10 The petition may include a request that the court appoint a 11 successor. Resignation of a guardian or conservator is effective on 12 the date the resignation is approved by the court.

13 (3) Death, removal, or resignation of a guardian or conservator 14 does not affect liability for a previous act or the obligation to 15 account for:

16 (a) An action taken on behalf of the individual subject to 17 guardianship or conservatorship; or

18

1

(b) The individual's funds or other property.

19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 113. NOTICE OF HEARING GENERALLY. (1) Except as otherwise provided in sections 203, 208, 303, 403, and 505 of this 20 act, if notice of a hearing under this chapter is required, the 21 movant shall give notice of the date, time, and place of the hearing 22 23 to the person to be notified unless otherwise ordered by the court 24 for good cause. Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, notice must be given in compliance with the local superior court's rule of 25 civil procedure at least fourteen days before the hearing. 26

(2) Proof of notice of a hearing under this chapter must be madebefore or at the hearing and filed in the proceeding.

(3) Notice of a hearing under this chapter must be in at least
sixteen-point font, in plain language, and, to the extent feasible,
in a language in which the person to be notified is proficient.

32 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 114. WAIVER OF NOTICE. (1) Except as 33 otherwise provided in subsection (2) of this section, a person may 34 waive notice under this chapter in a record signed by the person or 35 person's attorney and filed in the proceeding.

36 (2) A respondent, individual subject to guardianship, individual
 37 subject to conservatorship, or individual subject to a protective

1 arrangement under article 5 of this chapter may not waive notice 2 under this chapter.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 115. GUARDIAN AD LITEM. The court at any time 3 may appoint a guardian ad litem for an individual if the court 4 5 determines the individual's interest otherwise would not be adequately represented. If no conflict of interest exists, a guardian 6 ad litem may be appointed to represent multiple individuals or 7 interests. The guardian ad litem may not be the same individual as 8 the attorney representing the respondent. The court shall state the 9 10 duties of the guardian ad litem and the reasons for the appointment.

11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 116. REQUEST FOR NOTICE. (1) A person may 12 file with the court a request for notice under this chapter if the 13 person is:

14

(a) Not otherwise entitled to notice; and

(b) Interested in the welfare of a respondent, individual subject to guardianship or conservatorship, or individual subject to a protective arrangement under article 5 of this chapter.

18 (2) A request under subsection (1) of this section must include a 19 statement showing the interest of the person making the request and 20 the address of the person or an attorney for the person to whom 21 notice is to be given.

(3) If the court approves a request under subsection (1) of this section, the court shall give notice of the approval to the guardian or conservator, if one has been appointed, or the respondent if no guardian or conservator has been appointed.

26 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 117. DISCLOSURE OF BANKRUPTCY OR CRIMINAL 27 HISTORY. (1) Before accepting appointment as a guardian or 28 conservator, a person shall disclose to the court whether the person:

(a) Is or has been a debtor in a bankruptcy, insolvency, orreceivership proceeding; or

31 (b) Has been convicted of:

32 (i) A felony;

33 (ii) A crime involving dishonesty, neglect, violence, or use of 34 physical force; or

35 (iii) Other crimes relevant to the functions the individual would 36 assume as guardian or conservator.

1 (2) A guardian or conservator that engages or anticipates 2 engaging an agent the guardian or conservator knows has been 3 convicted of a felony, a crime involving dishonesty, neglect, 4 violence, or use of physical force, or other crimes relevant to the 5 functions the agent is being engaged to perform promptly shall 6 disclose that knowledge to the court.

7 (3) If a conservator engages or anticipates engaging an agent to 8 manage finances of the individual subject to conservatorship and 9 knows the agent is or has been a debtor in a bankruptcy, insolvency, 10 or receivership proceeding, the conservator promptly shall disclose 11 that knowledge to the court.

12 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 118. QUALIFICATIONS. (1) Any suitable person 13 over the age of eighteen years, or any parent under the age of eighteen years or, if the petition is for appointment of a 14 15 professional guardian or conservator, any individual or guardianship 16 or conservatorship service that meets any certification requirements 17 established by the administrator for the courts, may, if not 18 otherwise disgualified, be appointed guardian or conservator of a person subject to guardianship, conservatorship, or both. A financial 19 institution subject to the jurisdiction of the department of 20 21 financial institutions and authorized to exercise trust powers, and a federally chartered financial institution when authorized to do so, 22 may be appointed to act as a guardian or conservator of a person 23 24 subject to guardianship, conservatorship, or both without having to 25 meet the certification requirements established by the administrator for the courts. No person is qualified to serve as a quardian or 26 27 conservator who is:

(a) Under eighteen years of age except as otherwise providedherein;

30 (b) Convicted of a crime involving dishonesty, neglect, or use of 31 physical force or other crime relevant to the functions the 32 individual would assume as guardian;

33 (c) A nonresident of this state who has not appointed a resident 34 agent to accept service of process in all actions or proceedings with 35 respect to the estate and caused such appointment to be filed with 36 the court;

37 (d) A corporation not authorized to act as a fiduciary, guardian,38 or conservator in the state;

39 (e) A person whom the court finds unsuitable.

1 (2) If a guardian, or conservator is not a certified professional guardian, conservator, or financial institution authorized under this 2 section, the guardian or conservator must complete any standardized 3 training video or web cast for lay guardians or conservators made 4 available by the administrative office of the courts and the superior 5 6 court where the petition is filed unless granted a waiver by the court. The training video or web cast must be provided at no cost to 7 the guardian, or conservator. 8

9 (a) If a petitioner requests the appointment of a specific individual to act as a guardian or conservator, the petition for 10 11 quardianship or conservatorship must include evidence of the 12 successful completion of the required training video or web cast by the proposed guardian or conservator. The superior court may defer 13 the completion of the training requirement to a date no later than 14 ninety days after appointment if the petitioner requests expedited 15 16 appointment due to emergent circumstances.

17 (b) If no person is identified to be appointed guardian or 18 conservator at the time the petition is filed, then the court must 19 require the completion of the required training video or web cast by 20 a date no later than ninety days after the appointment.

21 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 119. MULTIPLE NOMINATIONS. If a respondent or 22 other person makes more than one nomination of a guardian or 23 conservator, the latest in time governs.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 120. COMPENSATION AND EXPENSES—IN GENERAL. (1) Unless otherwise compensated or reimbursed, an attorney for a respondent in a proceeding under this chapter is entitled to reasonable compensation for services and reimbursement of reasonable expenses from the property of the respondent.

(2) Unless otherwise compensated or reimbursed, an attorney or other person whose services resulted in an order beneficial to an individual subject to guardianship or conservatorship or for whom a protective arrangement under article 5 of this chapter was ordered is entitled to reasonable compensation for services and reimbursement of reasonable expenses from the property of the individual.

35 (3) Where the person subject to guardianship or conservatorship 36 is a department of social and health services client, or health care 37 authority client, and is required to contribute a portion of their 38 income towards the cost of long-term care services or room and board,

1 the amount of compensation or reimbursement shall not exceed the 2 amount allowed by the department of social and health services or 3 health care authority by rule.

4 (4) Where the person subject to guardianship or conservatorship 5 receives guardianship, conservatorships, or other protective services 6 from the office of public guardianship, the amount of compensation or 7 reimbursement shall not exceed the amount allowed by the office of 8 public guardianship.

9 (5) The court must approve compensation and expenses payable 10 under this section before payment. Approval is not required before a 11 service is provided or an expense is incurred.

12 (6) If the court dismisses a petition under this chapter and 13 determines the petition was filed in bad faith, the court may assess 14 the cost of any court-ordered professional evaluation or visitor 15 against the petitioner.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 121. COMPENSATION OF GUARDIAN OR CONSERVATOR. 16 (1) Subject to court approval, a guardian is entitled to reasonable 17 compensation for services as guardian and to reimbursement for room, 18 19 board, clothing, and other appropriate expenses advanced for the 20 benefit of the individual subject to guardianship. If a conservator, 21 other than the guardian or a person affiliated with the guardian, is individual, reasonable compensation 22 for the appointed and 23 reimbursement to the guardian may be approved and paid by the 24 conservator without court approval.

(2) Subject to court approval, a conservator is entitled to reasonable compensation for services and reimbursement for appropriate expenses from the property of the individual subject to conservatorship.

(3) In determining reasonable compensation for a guardian or conservator, the court, or a conservator in determining reasonable compensation for a guardian as provided in subsection (1) of this section, shall consider:

(a) The necessity and quality of the services provided;

34 (b) The experience, training, professional standing, and skills35 of the guardian or conservator;

36 (c) The difficulty of the services performed, including the 37 degree of skill and care required;

(d) The conditions and circumstances under which a service was
 performed, including whether the service was provided outside regular
 business hours or under dangerous or extraordinary conditions;

4 (e) The effect of the services on the individual subject to 5 guardianship or conservatorship;

6 (f) The extent to which the services provided were or were not 7 consistent with the guardian's plan under section 316 of this act or 8 conservator's plan under section 419 of this act; and

9 (g) The fees customarily paid to a person that performs a like 10 service in the community.

(4) A guardian or conservator need not use personal funds of the guardian or conservator for the expenses of the individual subject to guardianship or conservatorship.

(7) If an individual subject to guardianship or conservatorship seeks to modify or terminate the guardianship or conservatorship or remove the guardian or conservator, the court may order compensation to the guardian or conservator for time spent opposing modification, termination, or removal only to the extent the court determines the opposition was reasonably necessary to protect the interests of the individual subject to guardianship or conservatorship.

33 NEW SECTION. Sec. 122. LIABILITY OF GUARDIAN OR CONSERVATOR FOR ACT OF INDIVIDUAL SUBJECT TO GUARDIANSHIP OR CONSERVATORSHIP. (h) Whether the minor needs an interpreter, translator, or other form of support to communicate effectively with the court or understand court proceedings;

(i) Whether any parent of the minor needs an interpreter, translator, or other form of support to communicate effectively with the court or understand court proceedings; and

(j) Whether any other proceeding concerning the care or custody of the minor is pending in any court in this state or another jurisdiction.

37 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 203. NOTICE OF HEARING FOR APPOINTMENT OF 38 GUARDIAN FOR MINOR. (1) If a petition is filed under section 202 of

11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 208. STANDBY GUARDIAN FOR MINOR. (1) A 12 standby guardian appointed under this section may act as guardian, 13 with all duties and powers of a guardian under sections 210 and 211 14 of this act, when no parent of the minor is willing or able to 15 exercise the duties and powers granted to the guardian.

(5) Appointment of an emergency guardian under this section, with or without notice, is not a determination that a basis exists for appointment of a guardian under section 201 of this act.

(6) The court may remove an emergency guardian appointed under this section at any time. The emergency guardian shall make any report the court requires.

30 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 210. DUTIES OF GUARDIAN FOR MINOR. (1) A 31 guardian for a minor is a fiduciary. Except as otherwise limited by 32 the court, a guardian for a minor has the duties and responsibilities 33 of a parent regarding the minor's support, care, education, health, 34 safety, and welfare. A guardian shall act in the minor's best 35 interest and exercise reasonable care, diligence, and prudence.

36 (2) A guardian for a minor shall:

17 (f) Inform the court of any change in the minor's dwelling or 18 address; and

(g) In determining what is in the minor's best interest, take into account the minor's preferences to the extent actually known or reasonably ascertainable by the guardian.

22 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 211. POWERS OF GUARDIAN FOR MINOR. (1) Except 23 as otherwise limited by court order, a guardian of a minor has the 24 powers a parent otherwise would have regarding the minor's support, 25 care, education, health, safety, and welfare.

8 TERMINATION OF GUARDIANSHIP—APPOINTMENT OF SUCCESSOR. (1)
9 Guardianship under this chapter for a minor terminates:

10 (a) On the minor's death, adoption, emancipation, or attainment 11 of majority; or

(b) When the court finds that the standard in section 201 of this act for appointment of a guardian is not satisfied, unless the court finds that:

6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 301. BASIS FOR APPOINTMENT OF GUARDIAN FOR 7 ADULT. (1) On petition and after notice and hearing, the court may:

8 (a) Appoint a guardian for an adult if the court finds by clear 9 and convincing evidence that:

10 (i) The respondent lacks the ability to meet essential 11 requirements for physical health, safety, or self-care because the 12 respondent is unable to receive and evaluate information or make or 13 communicate decisions, even with appropriate supportive services, 14 technological assistance, or supported decision making; and

15 (ii) The respondent's identified needs cannot be met by a 16 protective arrangement instead of guardianship or other less 17 restrictive alternative; or

(b) With appropriate findings, treat the petition as one for a conservatorship under article 4 of this chapter or protective arrangement under article 5 of this chapter, issue any appropriate order, or dismiss the proceeding.

(2) The court shall grant a guardian appointed under subsection 22 23 (1) of this section only those powers necessitated by the 24 demonstrated needs and limitations of the respondent and issue orders 25 that will encourage development of the respondent's maximum selfdetermination and independence. The court may not establish a full 26 27 guardianship if a limited guardianship, protective arrangement instead of guardianship, or other less restrictive alternative would 28 29 meet the needs of the respondent.

30 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 302. PETITION FOR APPOINTMENT OF GUARDIAN FOR 31 ADULT. (1) A person interested in an adult's welfare, including the 32 adult for whom the order is sought, may petition for appointment of a 33 guardian for the adult.

34 (2) A petition under subsection (1) of this section must state
 35 the petitioner's name, principal residence, current street address,
 36 if different, relationship to the respondent, interest in the

1 appointment, the name and address of any attorney representing the 2 petitioner, and, to the extent known, the following:

12 (ii) Adult children or, if none, each parent and adult sibling of 13 the respondent, or, if none, at least one adult nearest in kinship to 14 the respondent who can be found with reasonable diligence; and

15 (iii) Adult stepchildren whom the respondent actively parented 16 during the stepchildren's minor years and with whom the respondent 17 had an ongoing relationship in the two-year period immediately before 18 the filing of the petition;

19 (c) The name and current address of each of the following, if 20 applicable:

(i) A person responsible for care of the respondent;

22 (ii) Any attorney currently representing the respondent;

23 (iii) Any representative payee appointed by the social security 24 administration for the respondent;

25 (iv) A guardian or conservator acting for the respondent in this 26 state or in another jurisdiction;

27 (v) A trustee or custodian of a trust or custodianship of which 28 the respondent is a beneficiary;

29 (vi) Any fiduciary for the respondent appointed by the department 30 of veterans affairs;

31 (vii) An agent designated under a power of attorney for health 32 care in which the respondent is identified as the principal;

33 (viii) An agent designated under a power of attorney for finances 34 in which the respondent is identified as the principal;

35 (ix) A person nominated as guardian by the respondent;

36 (x) A person nominated as guardian by the respondent's parent or 37 spouse or domestic partner in a will or other signed record;

38 (xi) A proposed guardian and the reason the proposed guardian 39 should be selected; and 1 (xii) A person known to have routinely assisted the respondent 2 with decision making during the six months immediately before the 3 filing of the petition;

4 (d) The reason a guardianship is necessary, including a brief 5 description of:

(i) The nature and extent of the respondent's alleged need;

6

7 (ii) Any protective arrangement instead of guardianship or other 8 less restrictive alternatives for meeting the respondent's alleged 9 need which have been considered or implemented;

10 (iii) If no protective arrangement instead of guardianship or 11 other less restrictive alternatives have been considered or 12 implemented, the reason they have not been considered or implemented; 13 and

14 (iv) The reason a protective arrangement instead of guardianship 15 or other less restrictive alternative is insufficient to meet the 16 respondent's alleged need;

17 (e) Whether the petitioner seeks a limited guardianship or full 18 guardianship;

(f) If the petitioner seeks a full guardianship, the reason a limited guardianship or protective arrangement instead of guardianship is not appropriate;

(g) If a limited guardianship is requested, the powers to be granted to the guardian;

(h) The name and current address, if known, of any person withwhom the petitioner seeks to limit the respondent's contact;

(i) If the respondent has property other than personal effects, a
general statement of the respondent's property, with an estimate of
its value, including any insurance or pension, and the source and
amount of other anticipated income or receipts; and

30 (j) Whether the respondent needs an interpreter, translator, or 31 other form of support to communicate effectively with the court or 32 understand court proceedings.

33 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 303. NOTICE OF HEARING FOR APPOINTMENT OF 34 GUARDIAN FOR ADULT. (1) All petitions filed under section 302 of this 35 act for appointment of a guardian for an adult shall be heard within 36 sixty-days unless an extension of time is requested by a party or the 37 visitor within such sixty-day period and granted for good cause 38 shown. If an extension is granted, the court shall set a new hearing 39 date.

1 (2) A copy of a petition under section 302 of this act and notice of a hearing on the petition must be served personally on the 2 respondent and the visitor appointed under section 304 of this act 3 not more than five court days after the petition under section 302 of 4 this act has been filed. The notice must inform the respondent of the 5 6 respondent's rights at the hearing, including the right to an 7 attorney and to attend the hearing. The notice must include a description of the nature, purpose, and consequences of granting the 8 notice 9 petition. (4) After the appointment of a guardian, notice of a hearing on a petition for an order under this article, together with a copy of the petition, must be given to:

- 22 (a) The adult subject to guardianship;
- 23 (b) The guardian; and
- 24 (c) Any other person the court determines.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 304. APPOINTMENT AND ROLE OF VISITOR. (1) On receipt of a petition under section 302 of this act for appointment of a guardian for an adult, the court shall appoint a visitor. The visitor must be an individual with training or experience in the type of abilities, limitations, and needs alleged in the petition.

30 (2) The court, in the order appointing a visitor, shall specify 31 the hourly rate the visitor may charge for his or her services, and 32 shall specify the maximum amount the visitor may charge without 33 additional court review and approval.

(3) (a) The visitor appointed under subsection (1) of this section shall within five days of receipt of notice of appointment file with the court and serve, either personally or by certified mail with return receipt, the respondent or his or her legal counsel, the petitioner or his or her legal counsel, and any interested party entitled to notice under section 116 of this act with a statement

including: His or her training relating to the duties as a visitor; 1 his or her criminal history as defined in RCW 9.94A.030 for the 2 period covering ten years prior to the appointment; his or her hourly 3 rate, if compensated; whether the guardian ad litem has had any 4 contact with a party to the proceeding prior to his or her 5 6 appointment; and whether he or she has an apparent conflict of interest. Within three days of the later of the actual service or 7 filing of the visitor's statement, any party may set a hearing and 8 file and serve a motion for an order to show cause why the visitor 9 should not be removed for one of the following three reasons: 10

(i) Lack of expertise necessary for the proceeding;

12 (ii) An hourly rate higher than what is reasonable for the 13 particular proceeding; or

(iii) A conflict of interest.

(b) Notice of the hearing shall be provided to the visitor and all parties. (4) A visitor appointed under subsection (1) of this section shall interview the respondent in person and, in a manner the respondent is best able to understand:

(a) Explain to the respondent the substance of the petition, the nature, purpose, and effect of the proceeding, the respondent's rights at the hearing on the petition, and the general powers and duties of a guardian;

(b) Determine the respondent's views about the appointment sought by the petitioner, including views about a proposed guardian, the guardian's proposed powers and duties, and the scope and duration of the proposed guardianship; and

33 (c) Inform the respondent that all costs and expenses of the 34 proceeding, including the respondent's attorney's fees, may be paid 35 from the respondent's assets.

36 (5) The visitor appointed under subsection (1) of this section 37 shall:

(a) Interview the petitioner and proposed guardian, if any;

1 (b) Visit the respondent's present dwelling and any dwelling in 2 which it is reasonably believed the respondent will live if the 3 appointment is made;

4 (c) Obtain information from any physician or other person known 5 to have treated, advised, or assessed the respondent's relevant 6 physical or mental condition; and

7 (d) Investigate the allegations in the petition and any other 8 matter relating to the petition the court directs.

9 (6) A visitor appointed under subsection (1) of this section 10 shall file a report in a record with the court and provide a copy of 11 the report to the respondent, petitioner, and any interested party 12 entitled to notice under section 116 of this act at least fifteen 13 days prior to the hearing on the petition filed under section 302 of 14 this act, which must include:

(a) A summary of self-care and independent living tasks the respondent can manage without assistance or with existing supports, could manage with the assistance of appropriate supportive services, technological assistance, or supported decision making, and cannot manage;

20 (b) A recommendation regarding the appropriateness of 21 guardianship, including whether a protective arrangement instead of 22 guardianship or other less restrictive alternative for meeting the 23 respondent's needs is available and:

(i) If a guardianship is recommended, whether it should be fullor limited; and

26 (ii) If a limited guardianship is recommended, the powers to be 27 granted to the guardian;

(c) A statement of the qualifications of the proposed guardian
 and whether the respondent approves or disapproves of the proposed
 guardian;

31 (d) A statement whether the proposed dwelling meets the 32 respondent's needs and whether the respondent has expressed a 33 preference as to residence;

34 (e) A recommendation whether a professional evaluation under 35 section 306 of this act is necessary;

36 (f) A statement whether the respondent is able to attend a 37 hearing at the location court proceedings typically are held;

38 (g) A statement whether the respondent is able to participate in 39 a hearing and which identifies any technology or other form of

1 support that would enhance the respondent's ability to participate; 2 and

3

(h) Any other matter the court directs.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 305. APPOINTMENT AND ROLE OF ATTORNEY FOR ADULT. (1) Unless the respondent in a proceeding for appointment of a guardian for an adult is represented by an attorney, the court shall appoint an attorney to represent the respondent, regardless of the respondent's ability to pay.

9 (2) An attorney representing the respondent in a proceeding for 10 appointment of a guardian for an adult shall:

12 (b) Advocate for the respondent's wishes to the extent reasonably 13 ascertainable; and

(c) If the respondent's wishes are not reasonably ascertainable, advocate for the result that is the least restrictive in type, duration, and scope, consistent with the respondent's interests.

17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 306. PROFESSIONAL EVALUATION. (1) At or 18 before a hearing on a petition for a guardianship for an adult, the 19 court shall order a professional evaluation of the respondent:

20

(a) If the respondent requests the evaluation; or

(b) In other cases, unless the court finds that it has sufficient information to determine the respondent's needs and abilities without the evaluation.

(2) If the court orders an evaluation under subsection (1) of 24 this section, the respondent must be examined by a physician licensed 25 26 to practice under chapter 18.71 or 18.57 RCW, psychologist licensed under chapter 18.83 RCW, or advanced registered nurse practitioner 27 licensed under chapter 18.79 RCW selected by the visitor who is 28 29 qualified to evaluate the respondent's alleged cognitive and 30 functional abilities and limitations and will not be advantaged or 31 disadvantaged by a decision to grant the petition or otherwise have a 32 conflict of interest. 6 (d) The date of the examination on which the report is based.

7 (3) The respondent may decline to participate in an evaluation8 ordered under subsection (1) of this section.

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 307. ATTENDANCE AND RIGHTS AT HEARING. (1) 10 Except as otherwise provided in subsection (2) of this section, a hearing under section 303 of this act may not proceed unless the 11 respondent attends the hearing. If it is not reasonably feasible for 12 the respondent to attend a hearing at the location court proceedings 13 typically are held, the court shall make reasonable efforts to hold 14 15 the hearing at an alternative location convenient to the respondent 16 or allow the respondent to attend the hearing using real-time audio-17 visual technology.

(a) Present evidence and subpoena witnesses and documents;

 and the visitor; and

3 (c) Otherwise participate in the hearing.

4 (6) Unless excused by the court for good cause, a proposed 5 guardian shall attend a hearing under section 303 of this act.

6 (7) A hearing under section 303 of this act must be closed on 7 request of the respondent and a showing of good cause.

8 (8) Any person may request to participate in a hearing under 9 section 303 of this act. The court may grant the request, with or 10 without a hearing, on determining that the best interest of the 11 respondent will be served. The court may impose appropriate 12 conditions on the person's participation.

13 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 308. CONFIDENTIALITY OF RECORDS. (1) The 14 existence of a proceeding for or the existence of a guardianship for 15 an adult is a matter of public record unless the court seals the 16 record after:

17 (a) The respondent or individual subject to guardianship requests18 the record be sealed; and

19 (b) Either:

20 (i) The petition for guardianship is dismissed; or

21 (ii) The guardianship is terminated.

37 (a) Appointment of an emergency guardian is likely to prevent

38 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 313. DUTIES OF GUARDIAN FOR ADULT. (1) A 39 guardian for an adult is a fiduciary. Except as otherwise limited by

the court, a guardian for an adult shall make decisions regarding the support, care, education, health, and welfare of the adult subject to guardianship to the extent necessitated by the adult's limitations.

4 (2) A guardian for an adult shall promote the self-determination

19 (3) A guardian for an adult at all times shall exercise 20 reasonable care, diligence, and prudence when acting on behalf of or 21 making decisions for the adult. In furtherance of this duty, the 22 guardian shall:

(a) Take reasonable care of the personal effects, pets, and service or support animals of the adult and bring a proceeding for a conservatorship or protective arrangement instead of conservatorship if necessary to protect the adult's property;

(b) Expend funds and other property of the adult received by the guardian for the adult's current needs for support, care, education, health, and welfare;

30 (c) Conserve any funds and other property of the adult not 31 expended under (b) of this subsection for the adult's future needs, 32 but if a conservator has been appointed for the adult, pay the funds 33 and other property at least quarterly to the conservator to be 34 conserved for the adult's future needs; and

(7) The guardian shall file with the court within thirty days of any substantial change in the condition of the person under guardianship or any changes in the residence of the person under guardianship and shall provide a copy of the notice to the adult subject to guardianship, a person entitled to notice under section 310(5) of this act or a subsequent order, and any other person the court has determined is entitled to notice.

30 (8) To inform any person entitled to notice under section 310(5) 31 of this act or a subsequent order, and any other person the court has 32 determined is entitled to notice, but in no case more than five 33 business days, after the person subject to guardianship:

34 (a) Makes a change in residence that is intended or likely to35 last more than fourteen calendar days;

36 (b) Has been admitted to a medical facility for acute care in 37 response to a life-threatening injury or medical condition that 38 requires inpatient care;

39 (c) Has been treated in an emergency room setting or kept for40 hospital observation for more than twenty-four hours; or

(d) Dies, in which case the notification must be made in person,

3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 314. POWERS OF GUARDIAN FOR ADULT. (1) Except 4 as limited by court order, a guardian for an adult may:

5 (a) Apply for and receive funds and benefits for the support of 6 the adult, unless a conservator is appointed for the adult and the 7 application or receipt is within the powers of the conservator;

(b) Petition for divorce, dissolution, or annulment of marriage of the adult or a declaration of invalidity of the adult's marriage; or

(ii) Include in the notice the address and nature of the new dwelling and state whether the adult received advance notice of the change and whether the adult objected to the change;

(d) Establish or move the permanent place of dwelling of the adult to a nursing home, mental health facility, or other facility that places restrictions on the adult's ability to leave or have visitors only if:

(ii) The court authorizes the establishment or move; or

(iii) The guardian gives notice of the establishment or move at least fourteen days before the establishment or move to the adult and all persons entitled to notice under section 310(5)(b) of this act or a subsequent order, and no objection is filed; (e) Establish or move the place of dwelling of the adult outside
 this state only if consistent with the guardian's plan and authorized
 by the court by specific order; and

6 (i) The action is specifically included in the guardian's plan 7 under section 316 of this act;

(ii) The court authorizes the action by specific order; or

9 (iii) Notice of the action was given at least fourteen days 10 before the action to the adult and all persons entitled to the notice 11 under section 310(5)(b) of this act or a subsequent order and no 12 objection has been filed.

13 (6) In exercising a guardian's power under subsection (1)(c) of 14 this section to make health care decisions, the guardian shall:

(a) Involve the adult in decision making to the extent reasonably feasible, including, when practicable, by encouraging and supporting the adult in understanding the risks and benefits of health care options;

(b) Defer to a decision by an agent under a power of attorney for health care executed by the adult and cooperate to the extent feasible with the agent making the decision; and

22 (c) Take into account:

(i) The risks and benefits of treatment options; and

(ii) The current and previous wishes and values of the adult, ifknown or reasonably ascertainable by the guardian.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 315. SPECIAL LIMITATIONS ON GUARDIAN'S POWER. 26 (1) Unless authorized by the court by specific order, a guardian for 27 an adult does not have the power to revoke or amend a power of 28 attorney for health care or power of attorney for finances executed 29 30 by the adult. If a power of attorney for health care is in effect, unless there is a court order to the contrary, a health care decision 31 of an agent takes precedence over that of the guardian and the 32 guardian shall cooperate with the agent to the extent feasible. (i) If the guardian delegated a power to an agent, the powerdelegated and the reason for the delegation;

(j) Any business relation the guardian has with a person the guardian has paid or that has benefited from the property of the adult;

32 (k) A copy of the guardian's most recently approved plan under 33 section 316 of this act and a statement whether the guardian has 34 deviated from the plan and, if so, how the guardian has deviated and 35 why;

36 (1) Plans for future care and support of the adult;

37 (m) A recommendation as to the need for continued guardianship38 and any recommended change in the scope of the guardianship; and

(n) Whether any co-guardian or successor guardian appointed to
 serve when a designated event occurs is alive and able to serve.

(7) An adult subject to guardianship who seeks to terminate or modify the terms of the guardianship has the right to choose an attorney to represent the adult in the matter. The court shall award reasonable attorneys' fees to the attorney for the adult as provided in section 120 of this act.

36 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 401. BASIS FOR APPOINTMENT OF CONSERVATOR. 37 (1) On petition and after notice and hearing, the court may appoint a 38 conservator for the property or financial affairs of a minor if the

including: His or her training relating to the duties as a visitor; 1 his or her criminal history as defined in RCW 9.94A.030 for the 2 period covering ten years prior to the appointment; his or her hourly 3 rate, if compensated; whether the guardian ad litem has had any 4 contact with a party to the proceeding prior to his or her 5 6 appointment; and whether he or she has an apparent conflict of interest. (iv) If a conservatorship is recommended, the amount of the bond or other asset protection arrangement needed under sections 416 and 417 of this act;

(b) A statement of the qualifications of the proposed conservator
 and whether the respondent approves or disapproves of the proposed
 conservator;

29 (c) A recommendation whether a professional evaluation under 30 section 407 of this act is necessary;

(d) A statement whether the respondent is able to attend a
 hearing at the location court proceedings typically are held;

33 (e) A statement whether the respondent is able to participate in 34 a hearing and which identifies any technology or other form of 35 support that would enhance the respondent's ability to participate; 36 and

37 (f) Any other matter the court directs.

38 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 406. APPOINTMENT AND ROLE OF ATTORNEY. (1) 39 Unless the respondent in a proceeding for appointment of a 1 conservator is represented by an attorney, the court shall appoint an 2 attorney to represent the respondent, regardless of the respondent's 3 ability to pay.

4 (2) An attorney representing the respondent in a proceeding for 5 appointment of a conservator shall:

(a) Make reasonable efforts to ascertain the respondent's wishes;

7 (b) Advocate for the respondent's wishes to the extent reasonably 8 ascertainable; and

16 (b) The court determines that counsel is needed to ensure that 17 consent to appointment of a conservator is informed; or

18 (c) The court otherwise determines the parent needs 19 representation.

20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 407. PROFESSIONAL EVALUATION. (1) At or 21 before a hearing on a petition for conservatorship for an adult, the 22 court shall order a professional evaluation of the respondent:

(a) If the respondent requests the evaluation; or

(b) In other cases, unless the court finds it has sufficient information to determine the respondent's needs and abilities without the evaluation.

(2) If the court orders an evaluation under subsection (1) of 27 28 this section, the respondent must be examined by a physician licensed to practice under chapter 18.71 or 18.57 RCW, psychologist licensed 29 30 under chapter 18.83 RCW, or advanced registered nurse practitioner 31 licensed under chapter 18.79 RCW selected by the visitor who is qualified to evaluate the respondent's alleged cognitive and 32 functional abilities and limitations and will not be advantaged or 33 disadvantaged by a decision to grant the petition or otherwise have a 34 conflict of interest. 9 (3) A respondent may decline to participate in an evaluation 10 ordered under subsection (1) of this section.

11 NEW SECTION. Sec. 408. ATTENDANCE AND RIGHTS AT HEARING. (1) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (2) of this section, a 12 hearing under section 403 of this act may not proceed unless the 13 respondent attends the hearing. If it is not reasonably feasible for 14 15 the respondent to attend a hearing at the location court proceedings 16 typically are held, the court shall make reasonable efforts to hold 17 the hearing at an alternative location convenient to the respondent 18 or allow the respondent to attend the hearing using real-time audiovisual technology. 19

If assistance would facilitate the 35 respondent's participation in the hearing, but is not otherwise 36 available to the respondent, the court shall make reasonable efforts 37 to provide it.

(4) The respondent has a right to choose an attorney to representthe respondent at a hearing under section 403 of this act.

1 (5) At a hearing under section 403 of this act, the respondent 2 may:

(a) Present evidence and subpoena witnesses and documents;

4 (b) Examine witnesses, including any court-appointed evaluator 5 and the visitor; and

(c) Otherwise participate in the hearing.

7 (6) Unless excused by the court for good cause, a proposed

1 (3) A report under section 405 of this act of a visitor or 2 professional evaluation under section 407 of this act is confidential 3 and must be sealed on filing, but is available to:

12 (e) Any other person if it is in the public interest or for a 13 purpose the court orders for good cause.

14 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 410. WHO MAY BE CONSERVATOR—ORDER OF 15 PRIORITY. (1) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (3) of this 16 section, the court in appointing a conservator shall consider persons 17 qualified to be a conservator in the following order of priority:

18 (a) A conservator, other than a temporary or emergency 19 conservator, currently acting for the respondent in another 20 jurisdiction;

(b) A person nominated as conservator by the respondent, including the respondent's most recent nomination made in a power of attorney for finances;

(d) A spouse or domestic partner of the respondent;

(e) A family member or other individual who has shown specialcare and concern for the respondent; and

31 (2) If two or more persons have equal priority under subsection (1) of this section, the court shall select as conservator the person 32 33 the court considers best qualified. 19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 411. ORDER OF APPOINTMENT OF CONSERVATOR. (1) 20 A court order appointing a conservator for a minor must include 21 findings to support appointment of a conservator and, if a full 22 conservatorship is granted, the reason a limited conservatorship 23 would not meet the identified needs of the minor.

(2) A court order appointing a conservator for a minor may dispense with the requirement for the conservator to file reports with the court under section 423 of this act if all the property of the minor subject to the conservatorship is protected by an asset protection arrangement.

(3) A court order appointing a conservator for an adult must:

5 (5) A court order establishing a limited conservatorship must 6 state the specific property placed under the control of the 7 conservator and the powers granted to the conservator.

8 (6) The court, as part of an order establishing a 9 conservatorship, shall identify any person that subsequently is 10 entitled to:

11 (a) Notice of the rights of the individual subject to 12 conservatorship under section 412(2) of this act;

13 (b) Notice of a sale of or surrender of a lease to the primary 14 dwelling of the individual;

15 (c) Notice that the conservator has delegated a power that 16 requires court approval under section 414 of this act or 17 substantially all powers of the conservator;

18 (d) Notice that the conservator will be unavailable to perform19 the conservator's duties for more than one month;

(e) A copy of the conservator's plan under section 419 of this
act and the conservator's report under section 423 of this act;

(f) Access to court records relating to the conservatorship;

23 (g) Notice of a transaction involving a substantial conflict 24 between the conservator's fiduciary duties and personal interests;

25 (h) Notice of the death or significant change in the condition of 26 the individual;

(i) Notice that the court has limited or modified the powers ofthe conservator; and

(j) Notice of the removal of the conservator.

30 (7) If an individual subject to conservatorship is an adult, the 31 spouse, domestic partner, and adult children of the adult subject to 32 conservatorship are entitled under subsection (6) of this section to 33 notice unless the court determines notice would be contrary to the 34 preferences or prior directions of the adult subject to 35 conservatorship or not in the best interest of the adult.

(8) If an individual subject to conservatorship is a minor, each
parent and adult sibling of the minor is entitled under subsection
(6) of this section to notice unless the court determines notice
would not be in the best interest of the minor.

1 (9) All orders establishing a conservatorship for an adult must 2 contain:

3 (a) A conservatorship summary placed directly below the case 4 caption or on a separate cover page in the form or substantially the 5 same form as set forth in section 606 of this act;

6 (b) The date which the limited conservator or conservator must 7 file the conservator's plan under section 419 of this act;

8 (c) The date which the limited conservator or conservator must 9 file an inventory under section 420 of this act;

10 (d) The date by which the court will review the conservator's 11 plan as required by section 419 of this act;

12 (e) The report interval which the conservator must file its 13 report under section 423 of this act. The report interval may be 14 annual, biennial, or triennial;

(f) The date the limited conservator or conservator must file its report under section 423 of this act. The due date of the filing of the report shall be within ninety days after the anniversary date of the appointment;

(g) The date for the court to review the report under section 423 of this act and enter its order. The court shall conduct the review within one hundred twenty days after the anniversary date of the appointment.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 412. NOTICE OF ORDER OF APPOINTMENT—RIGHTS. (1) A conservator appointed under section 411 of this act shall give to the individual subject to conservatorship and to all other persons given notice under section 403 of this act a copy of the order of appointment, together with notice of the right to request termination or modification. The order and notice must be given not later than fourteen days after the appointment.

(2) Not later than thirty days after appointment of a conservator 30 under section 411 of this act, the conservator shall give to the 31 individual subject to conservatorship and any other person entitled 32 to notice under section 411(6) of this act a statement of the rights 33 of the individual subject to conservatorship and procedures to seek 34 35 relief if the individual is denied those rights. The statement must 36 be in plain language, in at least sixteen-point font, and to the extent feasible, in a language in which the individual subject to 37 conservatorship is proficient. The statement must notify the 38 individual subject to conservatorship of the right to: 39

(a) Seek termination or modification of the conservatorship, or
 removal of the conservator, and choose an attorney to represent the

14 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 413. EMERGENCY CONSERVATOR. (1) On its own or 15 on petition by a person interested in an individual's welfare after a 16 petition has been filed under section 402 of this act, the court may 17 appoint an emergency conservator for the individual if the court 18 finds:

(a) Appointment of an emergency conservator is likely to prevent
 substantial and irreparable harm to the individual's property or
 financial interests;

(b) No other person appears to have authority and willingness toact in the circumstances; and

(c) There is reason to believe that a basis for appointment of a conservator under section 401 of this act exists.

(2) The duration of authority of an emergency conservator may not exceed sixty days and the emergency conservator may exercise only the powers specified in the order of appointment. The emergency conservator's authority may be extended once for not more than sixty days if the court finds that the conditions for appointment of an emergency conservator under subsection (1) of this section continue.

32 (3) Immediately on filing of a petition for an emergency 33 conservator, the court shall appoint an attorney to represent the 34 respondent in the proceeding. 18 (7) The court may remove an emergency conservator appointed under 19 this section at any time. The emergency conservator shall make any 20 report the court requires.

21 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 414. POWERS OF CONSERVATOR REQUIRING COURT 22 APPROVAL. (1) Except as otherwise ordered by the court, a conservator 23 must give notice to persons entitled to notice under section 403(4) 24 of this act and receive specific authorization by the court before 25 the conservator may exercise with respect to the conservatorship the 26 power to:

27

(a) Make a gift, except a gift of de minimis value;

(b) Sell, encumber an interest in, or surrender a lease to the
 primary dwelling of the individual subject to conservatorship;

30 (c) Convey, release, or disclaim a contingent or expectant 31 interest in property, including marital property and any right of 32 survivorship incident to joint tenancy or tenancy by the entireties;

(d) Exercise or release a power of appointment;

(e) Create a revocable or irrevocable trust of property of the
conservatorship estate, whether or not the trust extends beyond the
duration of the conservatorship, or revoke or amend a trust revocable
by the individual subject to conservatorship;

1 (f) Exercise a right to elect an option or change a beneficiary 2 under an insurance policy or annuity or surrender the policy or 3 annuity for its cash value;

4 (g) Exercise a right to an elective share in the estate of a 5 deceased spouse or domestic partner of the individual subject to 6 conservatorship or renounce or disclaim a property interest;

7 (h) Grant a creditor priority for payment over creditors of the 8 same or higher class if the creditor is providing property or 9 services used to meet the basic living and care needs of the 10 individual subject to conservatorship and preferential treatment 11 otherwise would be impermissible under section 428(5) of this act; 12 and

(i) Make, modify, amend, or revoke the will of the individualsubject to conservatorship in compliance with chapter 11.12 RCW.

15 (2) In approving a conservator's exercise of a power listed in 16 subsection (1) of this section, the court shall consider primarily 17 the decision the individual subject to conservatorship would make if 18 able, to the extent the decision can be ascertained.

19 (3) To determine under subsection (2) of this section the 20 decision the individual subject to conservatorship would make if 21 able, the court shall consider the individual's prior or current 22 directions, preferences, opinions, values, and actions, to the extent 23 actually known or reasonably ascertainable by the conservator. The 24 court also shall consider:

(a) The financial needs of the individual subject to conservatorship and individuals who are in fact dependent on the individual subject to conservatorship for support, and the interests of creditors of the individual;

29 (b) Possible reduction of income, estate, inheritance, or other 30 tax liabilities;

(c) Eligibility for governmental assistance;

32 (d) The previous pattern of giving or level of support provided33 by the individual;

34 (e) Any existing estate plan or lack of estate plan of the 35 individual;

36 (f) The life expectancy of the individual and the probability the 37 conservatorship will terminate before the individual's death; and

(g) Any other relevant factor.

39 (4) A conservator may not revoke or amend a power of attorney for40 finances executed by the individual subject to conservatorship. If a

1 power of attorney for finances is in effect, a decision of the agent 2 takes precedence over that of the conservator, unless the court 3 orders otherwise.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 415. PETITION FOR ORDER AFTER APPOINTMENT. An
 individual subject to conservatorship or a person interested in the
 welfare of the individual may petition for an order:

7 (1) Requiring the conservator to furnish a bond or collateral or 8 additional bond or collateral or allowing a reduction in a bond or 9 collateral previously furnished;

10 (2) Requiring an accounting for the administration of the 11 conservatorship estate;

12 (3) Directing distribution;

13 (4) Removing the conservator and appointing a temporary or 14 successor conservator;

15 (5) Modifying the type of appointment or powers granted to the 16 conservator, if the extent of protection or management previously 17 granted is excessive or insufficient to meet the individual's needs, 18 including because the individual's abilities or supports have 19 changed;

(6) Rejecting or modifying the conservator's plan under section 419 of this act, the conservator's inventory under section 420 of this act, or the conservator's report under section 423 of this act; or

(7) Granting other appropriate relief.

25 <u>NEW SECTION</u>. Sec. 416. BOND-ALTERNATIVE ASSET PROTECTION ARRANGEMENT. (1) Except as otherwise provided in subsections (3) and 26 (4) of this section, the court shall require a conservator to furnish 27 a bond with a surety the court specifies, or require an alternative 28 asset protection arrangement, conditioned on faithful discharge of 29 30 all duties of the conservator. The court may waive the requirement only if the court finds that a bond or other asset protection 31 32 arrangement is not necessary to protect the interests of the individual subject to conservatorship. Except as otherwise provided 33 34 in subsections (3) and (4) of this section, the court may not waive 35 the requirement if the conservator is in the business of serving as a conservator and is being paid for the conservator's service. 36

37 (2) Unless the court directs otherwise, the bond required under38 this section must be in the amount of the aggregate capital value of

the conservatorship estate, plus the estimated income for the 1 accounting and report review interval, less the value of property 2 deposited under an asset protection arrangement requiring a court 3 order for its removal and real property the conservator lacks power 4 to sell or convey without specific court authorization. The court, in 5 6 place of surety on a bond, may accept collateral for the performance 7 of the bond, including a pledge of securities or a mortgage of real 8 property.

9 (3) A regulated financial institution qualified to do trust 10 business in this state is not required to give a bond under this 11 section.

(4) In all conservatorships where the person subject to 12 conservatorship has total assets of a value of less than three 13 thousand dollars, the court may dispense with the requirement of a 14 15 bond: PROVIDED, That the conservator swears to report to the court 16 any changes in the total assets of the person subject to 17 conservatorship increasing their value to over three thousand dollars: PROVIDED FURTHER, That the conservator files a yearly 18 statement showing the monthly income of the person subject to 19 conservatorship if such monthly income, excluding moneys from state 20 21 or federal benefits, is over the sum of five hundred dollars per 22 month for any three consecutive months.

23 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 417. TERMS AND REQUIREMENTS OF BOND. (1) The 24 following rules apply to the bond required under section 416 of this 25 act:

26 (a) Except as otherwise provided by the bond, the surety and the27 conservator are jointly and severally liable.

(b) By executing a bond provided by a conservator, the surety 28 submits to the personal jurisdiction of the court that issued letters 29 30 of office to the conservator in a proceeding relating to the duties of the conservator in which the surety is named as a party. Notice of 31 the proceeding must be given to the surety at the address shown in 32 the records of the court in which the bond is filed and any other 33 34 address of the surety then known to the person required to provide 35 the notice.

36 (c) On petition of a successor conservator or person affected by 37 a breach of the obligation of the bond, a proceeding may be brought 38 against the surety for breach of the obligation of the bond.

(d) A proceeding against the bond may be brought until liability
 under the bond is exhausted.

3 (2) A proceeding may not be brought under this section against a 4 surety of a bond on a matter as to which a proceeding against the 5 conservator is barred.

6 (3) If a bond under section 416 of this act is not renewed by the 7 conservator, the surety or sureties immediately shall give notice to 8 the court and the individual subject to conservatorship.

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 418. DUTIES OF CONSERVATOR. (1) A conservator 10 is a fiduciary and has duties of prudence and loyalty to the 11 individual subject to conservatorship.

12 (2) A conservator shall promote the self-determination of the 13 individual subject to conservatorship and, to the extent feasible, 14 encourage the individual to participate in decisions, act on the 15 individual's own behalf, and develop or regain the capacity to manage 16 the individual's personal affairs.

(3) In making a decision for an individual subject to 17 conservatorship, the conservator shall make the decision the 18 conservator reasonably believes the individual would make if able, 19 20 unless doing so would fail to preserve the resources needed to maintain the individual's well-being and lifestyle or otherwise 21 22 unreasonably harm or endanger the welfare or personal or financial interests of the individual. To determine the decision the individual 23 24 would make if able, the conservator shall consider the individual's 25 prior or current directions, preferences, opinions, values, and 26 actions, to the extent actually known or reasonably ascertainable by 27 the conservator.

(4) If a conservator cannot make a decision under subsection (3) 28 of this section because the conservator does not know and cannot 29 30 reasonably determine the decision the individual subject to 31 conservatorship probably would make if able, or the conservator reasonably believes the decision the individual would make would fail 32 to preserve resources needed to maintain the individual's well-being 33 and lifestyle or otherwise unreasonably harm or endanger the welfare 34 or personal or financial interests of the individual, the conservator 35 shall act in accordance with the best interests of the individual. In 36 determining the best interests of the individual, the conservator 37 38 shall consider:

(a) Information received from professionals and persons that
 demonstrate sufficient interest in the welfare of the individual;

3 (b) Other information the conservator believes the individual 4 would have considered if the individual were able to act; and

5 (c) Other factors a reasonable person in the circumstances of the 6 individual would consider, including consequences for others.

7 (5) Except when inconsistent with the conservator's duties under 8 subsections (1) through (4) of this section, a conservator shall 9 invest and manage the conservatorship estate as a prudent investor 10 would, by considering:

11 (a) The circumstances of the individual subject to 12 conservatorship and the conservatorship estate;

13 (b) General economic conditions;

14 (c) The possible effect of inflation or deflation;

15 (d) The expected tax consequences of an investment decision or 16 strategy;

(e) The role of each investment or course of action in relationto the conservatorship estate as a whole;

19 (f) The expected total return from income and appreciation of 20 capital;

21 (g) The need for liquidity, regularity of income, and 22 preservation or appreciation of capital; and

(h) The special relationship or value, if any, of specificproperty to the individual subject to conservatorship.

(6) The propriety of a conservator's investment and management of the conservatorship estate is determined in light of the facts and circumstances existing when the conservator decides or acts and not by hindsight.

(7) A conservator shall make a reasonable effort to verify facts relevant to the investment and management of the conservatorship estate.

32 (8) A conservator that has special skills or expertise, or is 33 named conservator in reliance on the conservator's representation of 34 special skills or expertise, has a duty to use the special skills or 35 expertise in carrying out the conservator's duties.

36 (9) In investing, selecting specific property for distribution, 37 and invoking a power of revocation or withdrawal for the use or 38 benefit of the individual subject to conservatorship, a conservator 39 shall consider any estate plan of the individual known or reasonably

ascertainable to the conservator and may examine the will or other
 donative, nominative, or appointive instrument of the individual.

3 (10) A conservator shall maintain insurance on the insurable real 4 and personal property of the individual subject to conservatorship, 5 unless the conservatorship estate lacks sufficient funds to pay for 6 insurance or the court finds:

7

(a) The property lacks sufficient equity; or

8 (b) Insuring the property would unreasonably dissipate the 9 conservatorship estate or otherwise not be in the best interest of 10 the individual.

11 (11) If a power of attorney for finances is in effect, a 12 conservator shall cooperate with the agent to the extent feasible.

(12) A conservator has access to and authority over a digital asset of the individual subject to conservatorship to the extent provided by the revised uniform fiduciary access to digital assets act (chapter 11.120 RCW) or court order.

17 (13) A conservator for an adult shall notify the court if the 18 condition of the adult has changed so that the adult is capable of 19 exercising rights previously removed. The notice must be given 20 immediately on learning of the change.

(14) A conservator shall notify the court within thirty days of 21 any substantial change in the value of the property of the person 22 subject to conservatorship and shall provide a copy of the notice to 23 the person subject to guardianship, a person entitled to notice under 24 25 section 403 of this act or a subsequent order, and any other person the court has determined is entitled to notice and schedule a hearing 26 for the court to review the adequacy of the bond or other asset 27 28 protection arrangement under sections 416 and 417 of this act.

Sec. 419. CONSERVATOR'S PLAN. (1) A conservator, 29 NEW SECTION. 30 not later than ninety days after appointment, shall file with the court a plan for protecting, managing, expending, and distributing 31 the assets of the conservatorship estate. The plan must be based on 32 the needs of the individual subject to conservatorship and take into 33 account the best interest of the individual as well as the 34 individual's preferences, values, and prior directions, to the extent 35 known to or reasonably ascertainable by the conservator. 36 The conservator shall include in the plan: 37

38 (a) A budget containing projected expenses and resources,39 including an estimate of the total amount of fees the conservator

1 anticipates charging per year and a statement or list of the amount 2 the conservator proposes to charge for each service the conservator 3 anticipates providing to the individual;

4 (b) How the conservator will involve the individual in decisions 5 about management of the conservatorship estate;

6 (c) Any step the conservator plans to take to develop or restore 7 the ability of the individual to manage the conservatorship estate; 8 and

9

(d) An estimate of the duration of the conservatorship.

(2) A conservator shall give notice of the filing of the 10 11 conservator's plan under subsection (1) of this section, together 12 individual subject to with a copy of the plan, to the conservatorship, a person entitled to notice under section 411(6) of 13 14 this act or a subsequent order, and any other person the court determines. The notice must include a statement of the right to 15 16 object to the plan and be given not later than fourteen days after 17 the filing.

(3) An individual subject to conservatorship and any person
entitled under subsection (2) of this section to receive notice and a
copy of the conservator's plan may object to the plan.

(4) The court shall review the conservator's plan filed under subsection (1) of this section and determine whether to approve the plan or require a new plan. In deciding whether to approve the plan, the court shall consider an objection under subsection (3) of this section and whether the plan is consistent with the conservator's duties and powers. The court may not approve the plan until thirty days after its filing.

(5) After a conservator's plan under this section is approved by the court, the conservator shall provide a copy of the plan to the individual subject to conservatorship, a person entitled to notice under section 411(6) of this act or a subsequent order, and any other person the court determines.

33 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 420. INVENTORY—RECORDS. (1) Not later than 34 sixty days after appointment, a conservator shall prepare and file 35 with the appointing court a detailed inventory of the conservatorship 36 estate, together with an oath or affirmation that the inventory is 37 believed to be complete and accurate as far as information permits.

38 (2) A conservator shall give notice of the filing of an inventory39 to the individual subject to conservatorship, a person entitled to

notice under section 411(6) of this act or a subsequent order, and any other person the court determines. The notice must be given not later than fourteen days after the filing.

4 (3) A conservator shall keep records of the administration of the 5 conservatorship estate and make them available for examination on 6 reasonable request of the individual subject to conservatorship, a 7 guardian for the individual, or any other person the conservator or 8 the court determines.

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 421. ADMINISTRATIVE POWERS OF CONSERVATOR NOT 10 REQUIRING COURT APPROVAL. (1) Except as otherwise provided in section 11 414 of this act or qualified or limited in the court's order of 12 appointment and stated in the letters of office, a conservator has 13 all powers granted in this section and any additional power granted 14 to a trustee by law of this state other than this chapter.

15 (2) A conservator, acting reasonably and consistent with the 16 fiduciary duties of the conservator to accomplish the purpose of the 17 conservatorship, without specific court authorization or 18 confirmation, may with respect to the conservatorship estate:

(a) Collect, hold, and retain property, including property in which the conservator has a personal interest and real property in another state, until the conservator determines disposition of the property should be made;

(b) Receive additions to the conservatorship estate;

24 (c) Continue or participate in the operation of a business or 25 other enterprise;

26 (d) Acquire an undivided interest in property in which the27 conservator, in a fiduciary capacity, holds an undivided interest;

28 (e) Invest assets;

(f) Deposit funds or other property in a financial institution, including one operated by the conservator;

31 (g) Acquire or dispose of property, including real property in 32 another state, for cash or on credit, at public or private sale, and 33 manage, develop, improve, exchange, partition, change the character 34 of, or abandon property;

35 (h) Make ordinary or extraordinary repairs or alterations in a 36 building or other structure, demolish any improvement, or raze an 37 existing or erect a new party wall or building;

38 (i) Subdivide or develop land, dedicate land to public use, make39 or obtain the vacation of a plat and adjust a boundary, adjust a

difference in valuation of land, exchange or partition land by giving or receiving consideration, and dedicate an easement to public use without consideration;

(j) Enter for any purpose into a lease of property as lessor or
lessee, with or without an option to purchase or renew, for a term
within or extending beyond the term of the conservatorship;

7 (k) Enter into a lease or arrangement for exploration and removal 8 of minerals or other natural resources or a pooling or unitization 9 agreement;

10 (1) Grant an option involving disposition of property or accept 11 or exercise an option for the acquisition of property;

12 (m) Vote a security, in person or by general or limited proxy;

(n) Pay a call, assessment, or other sum chargeable or accruingagainst or on account of a security;

(o) Sell or exercise a stock subscription or conversion right;

16 (p) Consent, directly or through a committee or agent, to the 17 reorganization, consolidation, merger, dissolution, or liquidation of 18 a corporation or other business enterprise;

(q) Hold a security in the name of a nominee or in other form without disclosure of the conservatorship so that title to the security may pass by delivery;

22 (r) Insure:

(i) The conservatorship estate, in whole or in part, against
 damage or loss in accordance with section 418(10) of this act; and

25 (ii) The conservator against liability with respect to a third 26 person;

(s) Borrow funds, with or without security, to be repaid from theconservatorship estate or otherwise;

(t) Advance funds for the protection of the conservatorship state or the individual subject to conservatorship and all expenses, losses, and liability sustained in the administration of the conservatorship estate or because of holding any property for which the conservator has a lien on the conservatorship estate;

34 (u) Pay or contest a claim, settle a claim by or against the 35 conservatorship estate or the individual subject to conservatorship 36 by compromise, arbitration, or otherwise, or release, in whole or in 37 part, a claim belonging to the conservatorship estate to the extent 38 the claim is uncollectible; (v) Pay a tax, assessment, compensation of the conservator or any
 guardian, and other expense incurred in the collection, care,
 administration, and protection of the conservatorship estate;

4 (w) Pay a sum distributable to the individual subject to 5 conservatorship or an individual who is in fact dependent on the 6 individual subject to conservatorship by paying the sum to the 7 distributee or for the use of the distributee:

8

(i) To the guardian for the distributee;

9 (ii) To the custodian of the distributee under the uniform 10 transfers to minors act (chapter 11.114 RCW); or

(iii) If there is no guardian, custodian, or custodial trustee, a relative or other person having physical custody of the distributee;

14 (x) Bring or defend an action, claim, or proceeding in any 15 jurisdiction for the protection of the conservatorship estate or the 16 conservator in the performance of the conservator's duties;

(y) Structure the finances of the individual subject to conservatorship to establish eligibility for a public benefit, including by making gifts consistent with the individual's preferences, values, and prior directions, if the conservator's action does not jeopardize the individual's welfare and otherwise is consistent with the conservator's duties; and

(z) Execute and deliver any instrument that will accomplish orfacilitate the exercise of a power of the conservator.

25 NEW SECTION. Sec. 422. DISTRIBUTION FROM CONSERVATORSHIP ESTATE. Except as otherwise provided in section 414 of this act or 26 qualified or limited in the court's order of appointment and stated 27 28 in the letters of office, and unless contrary to a conservator's plan under section 419 of this act, the conservator may expend or 29 30 distribute income or principal of the conservatorship estate without 31 specific court authorization or confirmation for the support, care, 32 education, health, or welfare of the individual subject to conservatorship or an individual who is in fact dependent on the 33 individual subject to conservatorship, including the payment of child 34 35 or spousal support, in accordance with the following rules:

36 (1) The conservator shall consider a recommendation relating to 37 the appropriate standard of support, care, education, health, or 38 welfare for the individual subject to conservatorship or individual 39 who is dependent on the individual subject to conservatorship, made by a guardian for the individual subject to conservatorship, if any, and, if the individual subject to conservatorship is a minor, a recommendation made by a parent of the minor.

4 (2) The conservator acting in compliance with the conservator's 5 duties under section 418 of this act is not liable for an expenditure 6 or distribution made based on a recommendation under subsection (1) 7 of this section unless the conservator knows the expenditure or 8 distribution is not in the best interest of the individual subject to 9 conservatorship.

10 (3) In making an expenditure or distribution under this section, 11 the conservator shall consider:

12 (a) The size of the conservatorship estate, the estimated 13 duration of the conservatorship, and the likelihood the individual 14 subject to conservatorship, at some future time, may be fully self-15 sufficient and able to manage the individual's financial affairs and 16 the conservatorship estate;

(b) The accustomed standard of living of the individual subject to conservatorship and individual who is dependent on the individual subject to conservatorship;

20 (c) Other funds or source used for the support of the individual 21 subject to conservatorship; and

(d) The preferences, values, and prior directions of theindividual subject to conservatorship.

(4) Funds expended or distributed under this section may be paid 24 25 by the conservator to any person, including the individual subject to 26 conservatorship, as reimbursement for expenditures the conservator might have made, or in advance for services to be provided to the 27 individual subject to conservatorship or individual who is dependent 28 29 on the individual subject to conservatorship if it is reasonable to expect the services will be performed and advance payment is 30 31 customary or reasonably necessary under the circumstances.

32 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 423. CONSERVATOR'S REPORT AND ACCOUNTING— 33 MONITORING. (1) A conservator shall file with the court by the date 34 established by the court a report in a record regarding the 35 administration of the conservatorship estate unless the court 36 otherwise directs, on resignation or removal, on termination of the 37 conservatorship, and at any other time the court directs.

38 (2) A report under subsection (1) of this section must state or 39 contain: 1 (a) An accounting that lists property included in the 2 conservatorship estate and the receipts, disbursements, liabilities, 3 and distributions during the period for which the report is made;

4 (b) A list of the services provided to the individual subject to 5 conservatorship;

6 (c) A copy of the conservator's most recently approved plan and a 7 statement whether the conservator has deviated from the plan and, if 8 so, how the conservator has deviated and why;

9 (d) A recommendation as to the need for continued conservatorship 10 and any recommended change in the scope of the conservatorship;

11 (e) To the extent feasible, a copy of the most recent reasonably 12 available financial statements evidencing the status of bank 13 accounts, investment accounts, and mortgages or other debts of the 14 individual subject to conservatorship with all but the last four 15 digits of the account numbers and social security number redacted;

(f) Anything of more than de minimis value which the conservator, any individual who resides with the conservator, or the spouse, domestic partner, parent, child, or sibling of the conservator has received from a person providing goods or services to the individual subject to conservatorship;

(g) Any business relation the conservator has with a person the conservator has paid or that has benefited from the property of the individual subject to conservatorship; and

(h) Whether any co-conservator or successor conservator appointedto serve when a designated event occurs is alive and able to serve.

(3) The court may appoint a visitor to review a report under this section or conservator's plan under section 419 of this act, interview the individual subject to conservatorship or conservator, or investigate any other matter involving the conservatorship. In connection with the report, the court may order the conservator to submit the conservatorship estate to appropriate examination in a manner the court directs.

(4) Notice of the filing under this section of a conservator's report, together with a copy of the report, must be provided to the individual subject to conservatorship, a person entitled to notice under section 411(6) of this act or a subsequent order, and other persons the court determines. The notice and report must be given not later than fourteen days after filing.

1 (5) The court shall establish procedures for monitoring a report 2 submitted under this section and review each report at least annually 3 to determine whether:

4 (a) The reports provide sufficient information to establish the 5 conservator has complied with the conservator's duties;

6

(b) The conservatorship should continue; and

7

(c) The conservator's requested fees, if any, should be approved.

8 (6) If the court determines there is reason to believe a 9 conservator has not complied with the conservator's duties or the 10 conservatorship should not continue, the court:

(a) Shall notify the individual subject to conservatorship, the conservator, and any other person entitled to notice under section 411(6) of this act or a subsequent order;

(b) May require additional information from the conservator;

15 (c) May appoint a visitor to interview the individual subject to 16 conservatorship or conservator or investigate any matter involving 17 the conservatorship; and

(d) Consistent with sections 430 and 431 of this act, may hold a hearing to consider removal of the conservator, termination of the conservatorship, or a change in the powers granted to the conservator or terms of the conservatorship.

(7) If the court has reason to believe fees requested by a conservator are not reasonable, the court shall hold a hearing to determine whether to adjust the requested fees.

(8) A conservator must petition the court for approval of a report filed under this section. The court after review may approve the report. If the court approves the report, there is a rebuttable presumption the report is accurate as to a matter adequately disclosed in the report.

30 (9) An order, after notice and hearing, approving an interim 31 report of a conservator filed under this section adjudicates 32 liabilities concerning a matter adequately disclosed in the report, 33 as to a person given notice of the report or accounting.

(10) If the court approves a report filed under this section, the order approving the report shall set the due date for the filing of the next report to be filed under this section. The court may set the review at annual, biennial, or triennial intervals with the report due date to be within ninety days of the anniversary date of appointment. When determining the report interval, the court can consider: The length of time the conservator has been serving the

person under conservatorship; whether the conservator has timely 1 filed all required reports with the court; whether the conservator is 2 monitored by other state or local agencies; the income of the person 3 subject to conservatorship; the value of the property of the person 4 subject to conservatorship; the adequacy of the bond and other asset 5 protection arrangement(s); and whether there 6 have been any 7 allegations of abuse, neglect, or a breach of fiduciary duty against 8 the conservator.

9 (11) If the court approves a report filed under this section, the 10 order approving the report shall contain a conservatorship summary or 11 accompanied by a conservatorship summary in the form or substantially 12 in the same form as set forth in section 606 of this act.

(12) If the court approves a report filed under this section, the order approving the report shall direct the clerk of the court to reissue letters of office in the form or substantially in the same form as set forth in section 605 of this act to the conservator containing an expiration date which will be within one hundred twenty days after the date the court directs the conservator file its next report.

20 (13) An order, after notice and hearing, approving a final report 21 filed under this section discharges the conservator from all 22 liabilities, claims, and causes of action by a person given notice of 23 the report and the hearing as to a matter adequately disclosed in the 24 report.

Sec. 424. 25 NEW SECTION. ATTEMPTED TRANSFER OF PROPERTY BY 26 INDIVIDUAL SUBJECT TO CONSERVATORSHIP. (1) The interest of an 27 individual subject to conservatorship in property included in the conservatorship estate is not transferable or assignable by the 28 individual and is not subject to levy, garnishment, or similar 29 30 process for claims against the individual unless allowed under 31 section 428 of this act.

32 (2) If an individual subject to conservatorship enters into a 33 contract after having the right to enter the contract removed by the 34 court, the contract is void against the individual and the 35 individual's property but is enforceable against the person that 36 contracted with the individual.

37 (3) A person other than the conservator that deals with an38 individual subject to conservatorship with respect to property

1 included in the conservatorship estate is entitled to protection 2 provided by law of this state other than this chapter.

Sec. 425. TRANSACTION INVOLVING CONFLICT OF 3 NEW SECTION. INTEREST. A transaction involving a conservatorship estate which is 4 5 affected by a substantial conflict between the conservator's fiduciary duties and personal interests is voidable unless the 6 transaction is authorized by court order after notice to persons 7 entitled to notice under section 411(6) of this act or a subsequent 8 order. A transaction affected by a substantial conflict includes a 9 10 sale, encumbrance, or other transaction involving the conservatorship 11 estate entered into by the conservator, an individual with whom the conservator resides, the spouse, domestic partner, descendant, 12 sibling, agent, or attorney of the conservator, or a corporation or 13 other enterprise in which the conservator has a substantial 14 15 beneficial interest.

Sec. 426. PROTECTION OF PERSON DEALING WITH 16 NEW SECTION. CONSERVATOR. (1) A person that assists or deals with a conservator in 17 good faith and for value in any transaction, other than a transaction 18 19 requiring a court order under section 414 of this act, is protected as though the conservator properly exercised any power in question. 20 Knowledge by a person that the person is dealing with a conservator 21 alone does not require the person to inquire into the existence of 22 23 authority of the conservator or the propriety of the conservator's 24 exercise of authority, but restrictions on authority stated in letters of office, or otherwise provided by law, are effective as to 25 26 the person. A person that pays or delivers property to a conservator 27 is not responsible for proper application of the property.

(2) Protection under subsection (1) of this section extends to a procedural irregularity or jurisdictional defect in the proceeding leading to the issuance of letters of office and does not substitute for protection for a person that assists or deals with a conservator provided by comparable provisions in law of this state other than this chapter relating to a commercial transaction or simplifying a transfer of securities by a fiduciary.

35 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 427. DEATH OF INDIVIDUAL SUBJECT TO 36 CONSERVATORSHIP. (1) If an individual subject to conservatorship 37 dies, the conservator shall deliver to the court for safekeeping any will of the individual in the conservator's possession and inform the personal representative named in the will if feasible, or if not feasible, a beneficiary named in the will, of the delivery.

(2) If forty days after the death of an individual subject to 4 conservatorship no personal representative has been appointed and no 5 6 application or petition for appointment is before the court, the 7 conservator may apply to exercise the powers and duties of a personal representative to administer and distribute the decedent's estate. 8 The conservator shall give notice of his or her appointment and the 9 pendency of any probate proceedings as provided in RCW 11.28.237 and 10 11 shall also give notice to a person nominated as personal 12 representative by a will of the decedent of which the conservator is aware. The court may grant the application if there is no objection 13 and endorse the letters of office to note that the individual 14 formerly subject to conservatorship is deceased and the conservator 15 16 has acquired the powers and duties of a personal representative.

(3) On the death of an individual subject to conservatorship, the conservator shall conclude the administration of the conservatorship estate as provided in section 431 of this act.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 428. PRESENTATION AND ALLOWANCE OF CLAIM. (1) A conservator may pay, or secure by encumbering property included in the conservatorship estate, a claim against the conservatorship estate or the individual subject to conservatorship arising before or during the conservatorship, on presentation and allowance in accordance with the priorities under subsection (4) of this section. A claimant may present a claim by:

(a) Sending or delivering to the conservator a statement in a
 record of the claim, indicating its basis, the name and address of
 the claimant, and the amount claimed; or

30 (b) Filing the claim with the court, in a form acceptable to the 31 court, and sending or delivering a copy of the claim to the 32 conservator.

(2) A claim under subsection (1) of this section is presented on receipt by the conservator of the statement of the claim or the filing with the court of the claim, whichever first occurs. A presented claim is allowed if it is not disallowed in whole or in part by the conservator in a record sent or delivered to the claimant not later than sixty days after its presentation. Before payment, the conservator may change an allowance of the claim to a disallowance in

1 whole or in part, but not after allowance under a court order or 2 order directing payment of the claim. Presentation of a claim tolls 3 until thirty days after disallowance of the claim the running of a 4 statute of limitations that has not expired relating to the claim.

(3) A claimant whose claim under subsection (1) of this section 5 6 has not been paid may petition the court to determine the claim at 7 any time before it is barred by a statute of limitations, and the court may order its allowance, payment, or security by encumbering 8 9 property included in the conservatorship estate. If a proceeding is pending against the individual subject to conservatorship at the time 10 11 of appointment of the conservator or is initiated thereafter, the 12 moving party shall give the conservator notice of the proceeding if 13 it could result in creating a claim against the conservatorship 14 estate.

15 (4) If a conservatorship estate is likely to be exhausted before 16 all existing claims are paid, the conservator shall distribute the 17 estate in money or in kind in payment of claims in the following 18 order:

19

(a) Costs and expenses of administration;

(b) A claim of the federal or state government having priorityunder law other than this chapter;

(c) A claim incurred by the conservator for support, care, education, health, or welfare previously provided to the individual subject to conservatorship or an individual who is in fact dependent on the individual subject to conservatorship;

26

(d) A claim arising before the conservatorship; and

27 (e) All other claims.

(5) Preference may not be given in the payment of a claim under
subsection (4) of this section over another claim of the same class.
A claim due and payable may not be preferred over a claim not due
unless:

32 (a) Doing so would leave the conservatorship estate without 33 sufficient funds to pay the basic living and health care expenses of 34 the individual subject to conservatorship; and

35 (b) The court authorizes the preference under section 414(1)(h) 36 of this act.

37 (6) If assets of a conservatorship estate are adequate to meet 38 all existing claims, the court, acting in the best interest of the 39 individual subject to conservatorship, may order the conservator to 1 grant a security interest in the conservatorship estate for payment 2 of a claim at a future date.

3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 429. PERSONAL LIABILITY OF CONSERVATOR. (1) 4 Except as otherwise agreed by a conservator, the conservator is not 5 personally liable on a contract properly entered into in a fiduciary 6 capacity in the course of administration of the conservatorship 7 estate unless the conservator fails to reveal the conservator's 8 representative capacity in the contract or before entering into the 9 contract.

10 (2) A conservator is personally liable for an obligation arising 11 from control of property of the conservatorship estate or an act or 12 omission occurring in the course of administration of the 13 conservatorship estate only if the conservator is personally at 14 fault.

(3) A claim based on a contract entered into by a conservator in a fiduciary capacity, an obligation arising from control of property included in the conservatorship estate, or a tort committed in the course of administration of the conservatorship estate may be asserted against the conservatorship estate in a proceeding against the conservator in a fiduciary capacity, whether or not the conservator is personally liable for the claim.

(4) A question of liability between a conservatorship estate and the conservator personally may be determined in a proceeding for accounting, surcharge, or indemnification or another appropriate proceeding or action.

The 15 court shall award reasonable attorneys' fees to the attorney as 16 provided in section 120 of this act.

(5) Notice of a petition under subsection (3) of this section must be given to the individual subject to conservatorship, the conservator, and any such other person the court determines.

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 702. UNIFORMITY OF APPLICATION AND 10 CONSTRUCTION. In applying and construing this uniform act, 11 consideration must be given to the need to promote uniformity of the 12 law with respect to its subject matter among states that enact it.

Sec. 703. 13 RELATION TO ELECTRONIC SIGNATURES IN NEW SECTION. GLOBAL AND NATIONAL COMMERCE ACT. This act modifies, limits, 14 or 15 supersedes the electronic signatures in global and national commerce 16 act, 15 U.S.C. Sec. 7001 et seq., but does not modify, limit, or 17 supersede section 101(c) of that act, 15 U.S.C. Sec. 7001(c), or authorize electronic delivery of any of the notices described in 18 19 section 103(b) of that act, 15 U.S.C. Sec. 7003(b).

20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 704. APPLICABILITY. This chapter applies to: 21 (1) A proceeding for appointment of a guardian or conservator or 22 for a protective arrangement instead of guardianship or 23 conservatorship commenced after the effective date of this section; 24 and

(2) A guardianship, conservatorship, or protective arrangement instead of a guardianship or conservatorship in existence on the effective date of this section unless the court finds application of a particular provision of this act would substantially interfere with the effective conduct of the proceeding or prejudice the rights of a party, in which case the particular provision of this act does not apply and the superseded law applies.

32 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 705. SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this 33 act or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, 34 the remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other 35 persons or circumstances is not affected. NEW SECTION.Sec. 706.Sections 101 through 606, 702 through2704, and 707 of this act constitute a new chapter in Title 11 RCW.

3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 707. EFFECTIVE DATE. This act takes effect 4 January 1, 2020.
