- 3     1979 at the urging of Kenny Gamble, Ed Wright, and Dyana Williams; and
- 4             Whereas, President Bill Clinton formally declared June as Black Music Month
- 5     in 2000; and
- 6             Whereas, black singers, songwriters, musicians, sound engineers, composers,
- 7     record producers, disc jockeys, promoters, industry executives, and music educators
- 8     have shaped American music and transmitted it across the globe; and
- 9             Whereas, the experiences of black Americans have driven musical genres like
- 10    jazz, gospel, rock and roll, rhythm and blues, soul, hip hop, and rap; and
- 11            Whereas, the contributions of black artists—from Lead Belly, Mahalia Jackson,
- 12    and Nat King Cole, to Jimi Hendrix, Prince, and Beyoncé—have established an
- 13    indelible legacy in this country; and
- 14            Whereas, black music has influenced American literature, dance, fashion,
- 15    theater, film, and visual arts; and
